Strong Demand Exists For Good Securities
 NEW YORK, April 11.—(A. P.)—The new week on the stock exchange opened with a resumption of the post fortnight's extraordinary demand for securities of almost every variety. Many issues exceeded all previous high records of the year in the day's turn-over of 1,475,000 shares.

Rails were the more solid features of the session, although the substantial gains in that division were confined to secondary shares. Steels, motors and equipments all yielded considerably to the weight of realizing sales and oils eased with sugars, tobacco and local traction.

United States Steel rose to within a small fraction of par before the close, but reacted a point and a half below, finishing at a nominal advance.

Net gains of one or five points were registered by Gulf States, Bethlehem, Lackawanna and Crucible steels, Baldwin, Studebaker, Stromberg, Pierce-Arrow, Columbia Gas, Electric Storage Battery, Market Street Railway preferred and Manhattan Elevated.

Call loans were made at 4-1/2 per cent, while time money continued to rule at 4-1/2 to 4-3/4 per cent. Reported concessions on commercial paper were not confirmed.

Proceedings at the Genoa conference in its preliminary stages received favorable interpretation in the foreign exchange market. Sterling was conspicuously strong on the bourse quotation posted in London, but reacted moderately later. All allied remittance were better, the German rate showing appreciable improvement, and Czechoslovakian bills made further gains on the strength of the bonds recently placed here.

The bond market again followed the rapid race and higher prices set by the stock list. Trading was stimulated at the ready sale of the new Rio de Janeiro \$13,000,000 bond issue.

Liberty second 4s made a new high. Erie convertibles and Seaboard Air Line consolidated 6s rose two points each and Atchafalaya convertible 4s of 1929 gained 2-3/4.

Northern Pacific 2s, St. Paul 4s of 1925, Western Maryland 4s, Market Street Railway 5s, Interborough Rtdip Transit 5s and Goodrich 8s gained one to 1-3/4 points.

Wool Sales Expected Soon in Washington
 PORTLAND, April 11.—(A. P.)—Wool shearing is being carried on actively in Washington and will be under way in parts of Oregon late this month. Dealers are looking for business to open up in Washington in a few days when market values should be definitely established. At the present time there is much uncertainty as to what wool is actually worth. There has been no trading recently in this state and it is probable that actual operations will not be undertaken until wool has been shorn.

While the tariff is one of the most important of the vital questions now pending in relation to the wool trade, it is not likely to have any further effect on wool prices, at least, until after the present domestic clip is marketed. This seems to be the prevailing opinion among those who have made a study of the tariff question, with regard to its economic, as well as political, aspects.
