NEW BOTANIC GARDEN FOR NATION PROPOSED

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(U. P.)—Plans for a new National Botanic Garden in the nation's capital are being pressed forward under the direction of a Congressional committee headed by Senator Ramsdell, of Louisiana.

Lieutenant-Colonel Clarence O. Sherill, officer in charge of public buildings and grounds and executive officer of the Fine Arts Commission, has assured a joint conference of Senators and House members, who would handle the necessary legislation, that he is ready to turn over to the Botanic Garden the requisite land already owned by the Government.

Plans for the extension of the Botanic Garden are ambitiously intended to make it the greatest Botanic Garden in the world and to so situate it in the architectural layout of the National Capital as to make it renowned as well for its appearance as for what it contains. The plans include the laying out of a parkway from the Union Depot to the National Capitol. Under the plans of Architect Woods the main portion of the Botanic Garden would be artistically placed between the Washington Navy Yard and the Army War College.

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BUILDING TUNNEL UNDER THE HUDSON

NEW YORK, April 13.—(U. P.)—Work on the \$40,000,000 vehicular tunnel under the Hudson river is under way. Contracts call for completion in four years, including approach-ways.
The total length of the tunnel is 9,250 feet. The two tubes will have an hourly capacity in both directions of 3,800 vehicles. Each tube will have room for two automobiles abreast, and there will be a six-foot sidewalk.
The ventilation plan provides for changing the air forty times an hour and the projectors have no fear of gasoline fumes.
Each tube will have an outside diameter of twenty-nine feet six inches. The tubes will lie side by side.
The New York entrance will be at Broome and Varick streets, and the exit at Canal and Varick streets. As it will be necessary to go under the Erie Railroad yards, the New Jersey ends will be further back from the river, the entrance at Provost and 12th Streets, and the exit at Provost and 14th streets.
Following data indicates the magnitude of the work: Length of tunnel, 9,250 feet; distance between portals, 8,320 feet; distance between river shafts, 3,375 feet; length of under-river portion, 5,480 feet; two roadways, each twenty feet wide; headroom, thirteen feet six inches; estimated hourly capacity in both directions, 3,800 vehicles; estimated maximum daily capacity, 46,000 vehicles; maximum depth of top of tunnel below mean high water, seventy-two feet; maximum depth of roadway below mean high water, ninety-three feet.

Ground was broken for the first construction work March 31, 1922. The cost is being shared by the States of New York and New Jersey.
MARRIED WRONG SISTER
GENEVA, April 13.—(U. P.)—Captain Franz Oserheim, a Hungarian army officer, is trying to divorce his wife, who impersonated her sister at the altar. Captain Oserheim was to marry the second of three sisters named Brunner, at Bregenz, Lake Constance. The eldest sister, however, loved him and determined to marry him. On the wedding day she doped her sister and, heavily veiled, went through the marriage ceremony with the Captain. When they returned to the hotel, she confessed the deception and declared her love for the Captain who left alone for Hungary. Both are Catholics, and Captain Oserheim will have difficulty in obtaining a divorce.

CHICAGO, April 13.—(U. P.)—"If feminine hands are not guiding the destinies of industry within the next decade, it will be their own fault."

This was the declaration to the United Press of Mrs. Edith Jarvis Alden, first woman to attain a corporate position with a class one railroad. She was beginning her work as assistant secretary of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy. Her appointment was made by the board of directors.
"The failing of men in business is that they think it is a cold blooded proposition and the first thing they know they are in a rut," Mrs. Alden said, scribbling a hasty note on a rather efficient looking date pad.

Men Are Too Cold Blooded In Business

EDMONTON, Alberta.—Over 12,000 persons attended the lectures held on the mixed farming special trains, which recently completed a tour of the province, under the auspices of the provincial government in conjunction with the railways. There was an average attendance of 493 at each lecture.

"You know I can't understand all this talk about cruel business grinding persons' minds to powder and giving women masculine personalities."
