Clean Hay Desirable.

Hay growers of the west end of the county are making efforts to raise clean hay, which results show, always commands a premium because of its quality. At the hay hearing held recently in Hermiston, the value of clean hay was emphasized. Spring-toothing hay is a method advised by the Hermiston Experiment Station, as a means of drying the fields of cheat.

Cows to Be Tested.

Pendleton cows are to be tested next week for tuberculosis by Dr. J. P. Madden, federal inspector who recently completed tests in the Hermiston region. A meeting of local dairymen will be held on Saturday at 1:30 p. m. in the office of Fred Bennion, county agent, to make arrangements for the tests, and Mr. Bennion is asking that anyone who owns a cow or cows and who wishes to have tests made, telephone Mr. Bennion's office, giving name and address. Dr. Madden will return to Union county for tests April 24 and will be in Milton-Freewater May 1.
