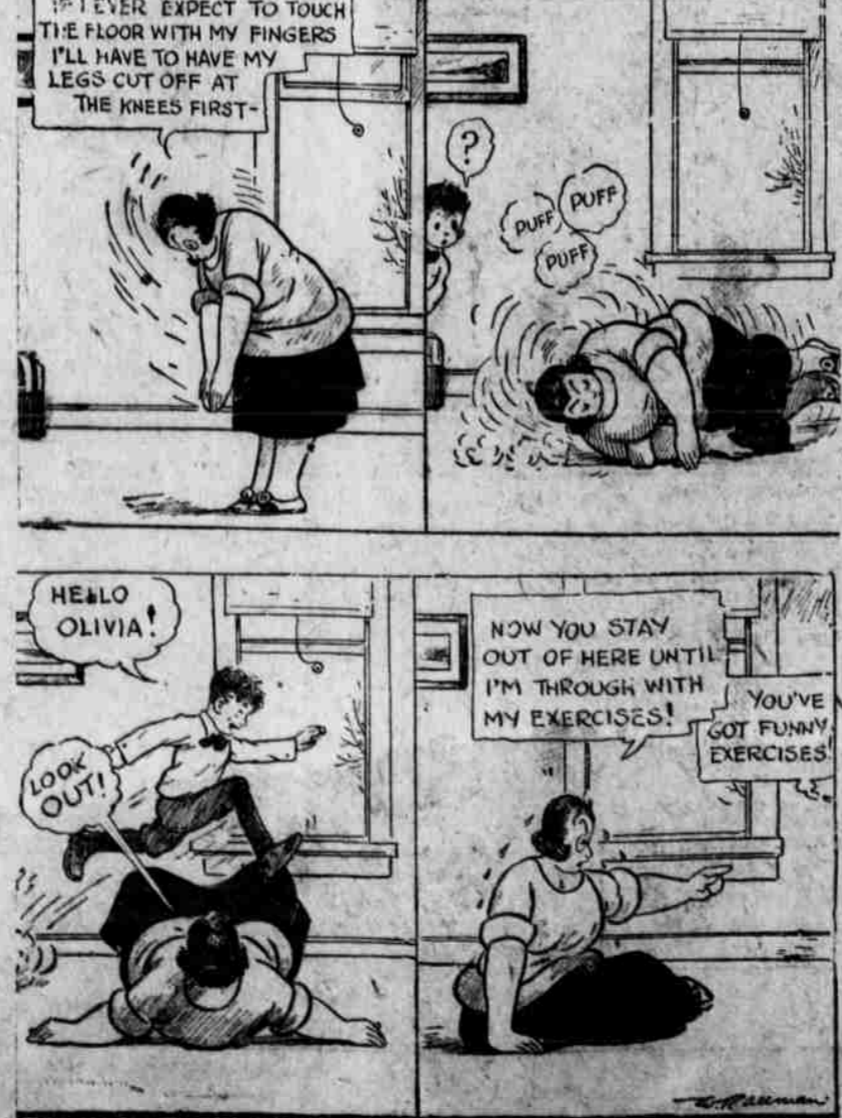
**LISLE BANK GOES BROKE.**
