HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES.

- ◆ Pickled Onions
- ◆ Select small white onions and sort into two sizes, one-half inch diameter in one and three-fourths inch in other. Peel, cover with fresh water, and let stand for two days, changing the water on second day. Wash well and put into brine for four days, changing brine at end of second day. Take out of brine and out into boiling water. Let stand for ten minutes, then put into cold water for two hours.
- ◆ Drain, and pack into jars, putting in a few small red peppers, and garnishing with sprigs of dill. Fill jars to overflowing with spiced vinegar, made previously, as below, and allowed to stand for a few days with spice-days left in it. Process as for pickles.
- ◆ Spiced Vinegar for Pickled Onions
- ◆ 1-2 gallon of vinegar.
- ◆ 1-2 tablespoonsful of celery seed.
- ◆ 1-2 cupful of grated horseradish.
- ◆ 1 cupful of sugar.
- ◆ 1-2 tablespoonsful of mustard seed.
- ◆ 1 tablespoonful of salt.
- ◆ 1 tablespoonful of cinnamon.

STATE MAKES STRONG ATTACK ON BLIZZARD
CHARLESTON, W. Va., May 18.—(A. P.)—The prosecution in the trial of Bill Blizard, union mine leader, on treason charges, launched a strong counter-attack today aimed to sweep aside the defense motions for dismissal of the treason indictment. A. M. Belcher, states chief counsel, rallied scores of precedents from legal archives to prove the contention that Blizard was guilty of high treason against the West Virginia state government in leading the miners' march on Logan county. "A man may be guilty of treason without actually fighting the state," Belcher said. "This defendant would be guilty even if he did not march with his men."

EIGHT KILLED IN BELFAST FIGHTING
BELFAST, May 18.—(U. P.)—Eight persons, including five Sinn Fein gunmen were killed in pitched battles and bombings here today. Police and military are making a house to house search of the republican quarter for gangsters who invaded the Musgrave police barracks murdering a constable. It is feared more fighting will take place should these searching forces find what they seek.

19 BURNED TO DEATH IN HOSPITAL FIRE
ROME, May 18.—(U. P.)—Nineteen persons were burned to death when the Santo Spirito hospital burned today. The Santo Spirito hospital is in the vicinity of St. Peter's Cathedral. Eight hundred persons were imperilled. Four besides those dead were seriously burned, one fatally. Several firemen and guards were injured during the heroic rescue work.
