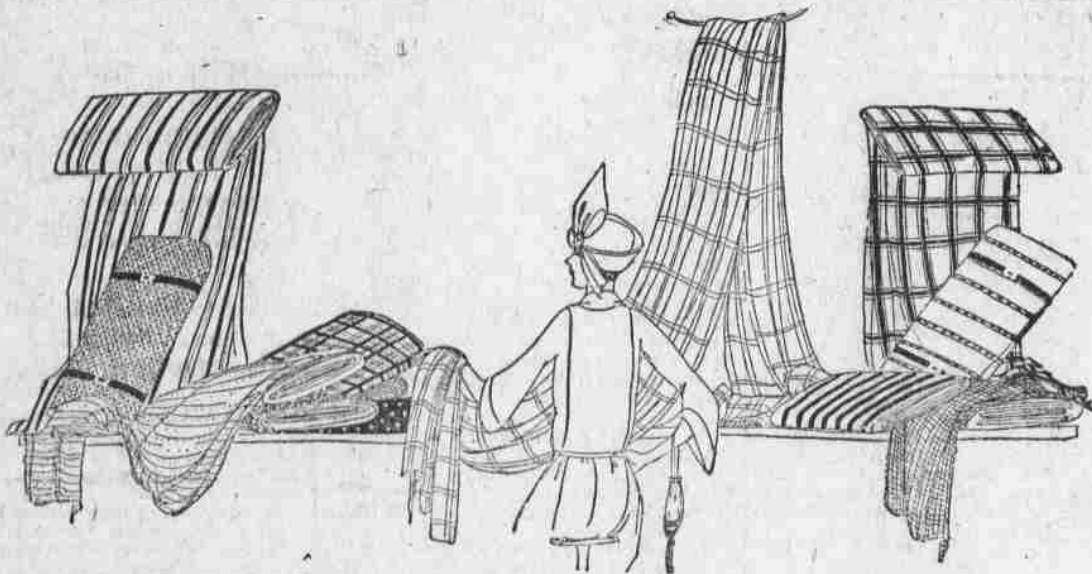

Mrs. Mallory Is After Scalp of Lenglen

NEW YORK, June 1.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Mollie Mallory, queen of the American courts, is in England getting ready for the biggest bid of her career.

While her announced mission is the annexation of the European woman's tennis championship, her real motive is to "get" Mlle Suzanne Lenglen, the present title holder.

If the tournament goes according to form and the French girl defends her title, Mrs. Mallory probably will play her for the title so it all means the same.

If the parlance of the ring applies to tennis, Mrs. Mallory could be advertised as going out to knock the French girl flatter than Dempsey flattened Carpentier.

However, being a far more polite sport in which she engages, Mrs. Mallory says she is merely setting out for the title and leaves the rest to imagination.

The American champion could hardly restrain her wrath "for publication" when Mlle Lenglen walked off the courts at Forest Hills last summer with a cough that gave Mrs. Mallory a victor that can't be taken off the books as a questionable defeat.

The feeling dated back to Wimbledon when the French girl was quoted as saying that the American had a big nerve in flouting that she could play tennis. Both are belligerently inclined as they had a warm set on the courts during the final match for the British championship which Lenglen won.

Mrs. Mallory figured that she was getting her revenge far sweeter than she hoped for last summer at Forest Hills and she naturally felt some indignation when her victory was robbed of the sting that she wanted to put in it.

There is some doubt that Mlle Lenglen will play this year to defend her title. Her cough is better, but the strain of coughing is said to have weakened her heart and she fears that the family physician will not let her play the American again.

If the two should come through to the final round this year, it ought to be a battle good enough for Boyle's Thirty Acres, with a top of fifty dollars.

Preacher Explains the Wants of Labor

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 1.—"An educated laboring class will not be denied," declared Rev. Alva W. Taylor, secretary of the Board of Temperance and Social Welfare, Church of Christ, in an address here on "What Labor Wants." He said the labor questions of today are largely due to the free education of the children of laborers.

"Labor wants what the middle class has," continued Rev. Mr. Taylor. Labor wants security in employment, adequate leisure and a normal home.

"Without adequate income none of the good things of life are possible. It has been said that capital takes the chances. Labor takes chances on bread and butter. In a normal year 6,000,000 wage earners are out of work one month, or more, one-half of them from one to three months and one-third from one to six months. According to Government reports, in the great basic industries, the average loss of employment is 25 per cent of the time.

"A movement now is on to put working hours back to those of a decade ago. Without leisure the alien worker cannot be Americanized and no wage earner has opportunity for education, recreation, character-building, love of home, of the good and beautiful.

"Many children are in industry instead of in school and thus are deprived of an equal chance at life with the children of the middle class. At present virtually one-fourth of all our American women are engaged in gainful occupation."

SHORT SKIRTS TABOO IN NORMAL INSTITUTE

NEW ORLEANS, La., June 1.—Skirts worn above the knee are banned by the student body of the normal school here. It was announced recently.

The announcement was made because of criticism of attire worn by the girls on a recent trip aboard an excursion steamer.

Critics said the girls wore "em above the bend.

In their announcement the student body terms the accusation an insult. "Normal school girls know better than to wear skirts above the knees," says the announcement. "They have never appeared like that in public. Never will they. While we want none of our girls to feel as if they must not wear skirts above the knees we do not believe we should regulate the length of dresses, for some girls are taller than others."
