QUESTION OF SWIMMING POOL IMMODESTY CAUSE OF DEBATE IN DETROIT

DETROIT, Mich., June 1.—"Are swimming pools conducive to immodesty?"

Members of the Detroit Board of Education have taken up opposite camps in debate on this question. It arose with the development that pupils of some of the city's public schools bathed in the swimming pool entirely naked.

"I cannot believe that our pupils bathe in the altogether," Board President Edward D. Devine declared, when he learned of the situation. He is supported in his stand against the practice by Andrew B. White, a Sunday school superintendent, and the congregation of the East Grand Boulevard Methodist Church.

A suggestion that the wearing of bathing trunks be made compulsory was vigorously attacked by supporters of the affirmative in the debate, who declared that such procedure would be "prudent."

The question remains on the board's books for further argument.

GIANT SHIPS COMPETE FOR MILEAGE RECORD

LONDON, June 1.—The old competition for supremacy in the Atlantic is again in full swing.

The Mauretania has established a new record in making a passage from America at the average rate of 26 1/2 knots, the previous record being 25 knots.

The Majestic, the world's largest ship, has just taken to the waters, and it is expected that on her second or third voyage she will attempt to eclipse the Mauretania's record. On her trial run the Majestic made 25 knots without being pushed.

Advances which have been made in ocean voyaging may be seen when records are produced showing that in 1840 the Commodore liner Britannia averaged fourteen days in crossing the ocean, at an average speed of 8 1/2 knots.

Shipping circles here are watching the performances of the Majestic with the greatest interest, as it is freely predicted that never will a ship of her size be built again.
