INDUSTRY TO BE CURBED BY COAL SHORTAGE SOON

WASHINGTON, June 2.—(U. P.)—Industrial activity will be curbed within three weeks as a result of the coal shortage, government fuel experts stated today. The nation's coal supply is now half what it was before the strike started eight weeks ago.
