Feeders are trying to contract in the stack at \$5 or \$9 but are finding few takers.

## Japanese Resist Any Reduction In Army Strength

TOKYO (By Mail to United Press).—There may be another war almost any time.

That's what General Gichi Tanaka, former Minister of War was quoted as saying in an interview published in the Nichi Nichi, one of the foremost Japanese newspapers.

Tanaka is generally regarded here as leader of the militarists, since the death of Field Marshal Prince Yamagata. However, the militarists were weakened greatly by Yamagata's death, and there is opposition to the militarists now by men who did not dare undertake that fight while Yamagata lived.

Tanaka is firmly against the present effort to reduce the Japanese regular army.

"If it were absolutely certain that there would be no more war in the world," he said in the Nichi Nichi interview, "I would be absolutely in favor of army reduction—in fact, under such conditions, I would want to abolish the entire army. But, as it is, there is no knowing when there will be another war. So long as there is any such possibility it is only proper for us to be prepared for any emergency. To reduce the army blindly would be very dangerous for Japan." The Nichi Nichi added that Tanaka

is greatly concerned over "signs of the times indicating a weakening of the military spirit" and that he is "determined to fight resolutely to preserve that spirit."

Also, General Yamashita, war minister, in an interview not long ago urged the Japanese to preserve their "military spirit." He added, however, that this spirit, which had brought Japan to its present position, could be applied to peace pursuits as well as war. He urged the maintenance of the spirit, not necessarily for war, but for industrial, commercial and other developments.

Russia and China are the countries named by military leaders here as the potential trouble spots, necessitating Japanese preparedness. They declare, with unanimity, that they have no thought whatever of war with America.

## Convention Hall is Planned at Capital

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Plans are being completed for the erection here of an immense auditorium to permit Washington, the logical selection for meetings of national and international importance, to assume the position of the greatest convention city in the United States.

The designs for the steel framework of the building will soon be completed, and actual work on the erection of the structure will begin before Fall, according to the Washington Auditorium committee.

The mammoth convention hall will be located near the heart of the city and the downtown hotels. The most prominent feature of the main floor will be the auditorium, which will have a seating capacity of 6,000. By opening adjoining rooms the seating capacity can be increased to 7,000. All the floors, walls, partitions, roof and fittings are to be fireproof, and the exterior will be a composition similar to granite.

## 648 MINERS LOSE LIVES IN FOUR-MONTH PERIOD

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Accidents in coal mines in the United States during the first four months of 1922 took a toll of 648 lives, according to the Bureau of Mines. This figure represents a fatality rate of 2.83 for each million tons of coal produced.

## LEGION OFFERS PRIZES IN NATIONAL CONTEST

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 5.—To encourage higher education and patriotic research among school children of the country, the American Legion is sponsoring a national essay contest which has for prizes \$1,500 in scholarships. The contest opened June 2 and closes at midnight August first.

The service men's organization has asked the cooperation of state, city and county school superintendents, seeking contributions of essays from every eligible school child. American officers of Legion posts will assist the educational authorities in the effort.

All girls and boys between the ages of 12 and 18 years inclusive are eligible. The subject to be written on is: "How the American Legion can best serve the nation." The rules provide that each contestant shall submit but one essay of not more than 500 words, and that essays shall be written in an affirmative and constructive way.

County superintendents of schools are asked to name three judges to select the best essay in each county. The winning essays of the counties will then be judged by a state committee, selected by the state superintendent of schools or school commissioner, for the purpose of selecting the three state winners.

First, second and third national prize winners will be made from the three best essays of each state, and will be announced several weeks after September 29 by the national judges, whose names will be given out later. The three national prizes will be known as American Legion scholarship awards, consisting of a first prize of \$750, second of \$500 and a third of \$250, derived from a fund donated personally by Commander Hanford MacNider.

## Predicting Weather From Earthquakes

TOKYO (By Mail to United Press).

The more you learn about earthquakes the less you know about 'em. For instance, I met a man not long ago, who told me he had a scheme for using earthquakes as a basis for weather forecasting. Tell him the hour of the earthquake and he'll tell you what sort of weather it'll be tomorrow.

Since there is an average of four earthquakes a day in Japan—although most of 'em are flivvers—and since there is also an abundance of weather hereabouts, it occurred to me that his idea offered tremendous possibilities. I begged him to tell me the secret and he consented. However, he was very careful about it. He said he would write it out (or me, very clearly and precisely)—so it would be perfectly lucid and simple and understandable. He said he would make it so plain that even a child could take an earthquake, so to speak, and out-predict the government weather bureau.

He sent me the letter. I've lost a good deal of sleep over it. The more I read that letter the more I—well, anyway, here it is, exactly as the expert sent it to me. Read it and maybe you'll know weather to carry an umbrella tomorrow.

"Dear Sir.—You will please excuse me for my delay to submit to your examination the summary of my thesis on 'The Effect of an Earthquake on the Elements.' It is as follows:

"Translated in modern time-table. Both for A. M. and P. M. 8 and 4, rain. 2 to 6, drought (or fine), 10 and 12, wind."

"People in olden times were satisfied with very rough measures. They will, however, make no objection to your prescribing further details as best suit your pleasure."

"What if it quaked at exactly 3, 5, 7, 9 or 11, you may ask. To such questions let it be answered on the authority of the seismological chronology, that it has never once pleased the earthquake to shake so punctually in the interests of an exact calculation. It has always been either before or after it, so you may be able to pronounce your forecast according to the comparative distance to the prescribed points of time behind or ahead of it. Consequently this much has practically sufficed in spite of theoretical defects. Hoping this will satisfy you, I am, yours truly. (Signed)."

## MANY FIRMS TO FAIL M'INTOSH DECLARES

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 5.—"Between 25,000 and 30,000 business firms will be put out of business every year for the next decade," declared Charles Henry McIntosh, Chicago, president of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, addressing members of the Columbus Chamber of Commerce here.

"It doesn't require brains to do business on a rising market, but it demands brains of the highest order to do business at a profit during a period of declining prices," continued McIntosh.

Because of this, he said, there will be numerous failures of business firms during the next ten years.

McIntosh predicted that the present trend of prices will continue downward for at least twenty-five years. Asserting that declining prices do not mean that hard times will continue, he stated that business men must become adjusted to the new condition.

Declaring that not many business men today have operated on a falling market, McIntosh said the business man must "be on the alert" during the next twenty-five years.

## Thistles Make Silage

Bad patches of Canada thistles in grain may be cut out which the grain is in the milk or early stage and made into good silage.

If the patch is mowed up and kept cultivated off below the ground all summer the patch will be greatly weakened or killed out. Fall seeding of vetch and oats on these patches will help further in a mowing-out the stranglers that survive.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.
