Celebration Discussed.

The celebration of Armistice Day, November 11, was the chief topic for discussion at a meeting of the American Legion here last night. Athena has invited all seven posts in the county to be guests, but some members of the Legion favor a joint celebration, with a morning program in Pendleton and an afternoon celebration in Athena. The matter will be decided on the last Friday of this month, June 30, when the county council meets in Hermiston.

Mix Makes Plans.

Tom Mix famous motion picture star, is making his preparations to attend the Pendleton Round-Up September 21, 22 and 23, says a telegram received today by Justice H. Marsh, secretary of the Round-Up association from S. R. Thompson, director who is now a California visitor. Mr. Hicks is also arranging today for seats for 75 people who will be in a party comprising a Tour C trip by the Bureau of service for national parks and resorts.
