Twelve directors of the Lake county bank, President Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural College, and President Campbell of the University of Oregon will administer the trust.

PARIS, June 7.—(I. N. S.)—A new sequel to "The Three Musketeers" has appeared in Paris. The sequel is not a posthumous work of Alexander Dumas. Athos, Porthos and Aramis do not dash through romantic pages. It is nothing more nor less than a lawsuit, filed by the widow of Auguste Maquet, who assisted Dumas in his famous "novel factory."

Madam Maquet claims her husband was part author of the famous novel and demands from Dumas' heirs a share of the income derived from the book. She also demands that all new editions of the romance bear Maquet's name on the title page as co-author. The widow alleges that Maquet sold his rights in the novel to Dumas for twenty years for the sum of \$30,000.

The old buildings have been repaired and remodeled and many new ones have been built. The hospital is exclusively for ex-service men, especially men affected with tuberculosis.
