R. Davis, a member of the train crew. His bond was fixed at \$750 and he is a guest of the sheriff.

To Try Out Tires.

An exhibition of the resistance Lee puncture proof tires can offer to the usual enemies of pneumatic tires will be made in Pendleton Friday and Saturday by a special agent of the Lee company. The exhibition will consist of running the car equipped with Lee tires over a board having nails in it. Glass, barbed wire, nails and other material which is usually a source of loss to ordinary tire users will be run over repeatedly. Small steel disks interwoven in different layers of the case fabric provides the strength which the dealers, Allen Knight, claim makes the tire immune from punctures.

Pupils Win Prizes.

Hold Fruit Meeting.

A meeting of fruit growers was held yesterday afternoon at the home of M. C. Barager near Stanfield when Fred Benmon made a talk on the value of thinning. He also gave the results of the first year's demonstrations in three orchards in the Milton Free-water district last year. Following the talk to the orchardists, a demonstration in thinning was given. Mr. Barager has 55 acres in orchard. Of this, 40 acres are planted to apples, five to cherries and five to peaches with the other five in miscellaneous fruit, including vineyard. The orchard promises a large crop of fruit this year. The peaches will be short and the cherries are hurt, but the apple crop will be good. Benmon called attention to the fact that the crop in the East and Middle West this year will be large, which will behoove Western growers to see that as much of their crop as possible grades high in both size and color, he said.

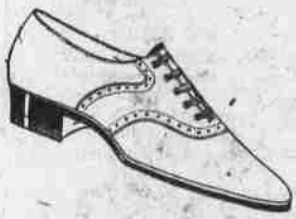

FLAPPER HAS NO SOUL, ARTIST SAYS

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 7.—"The modern girl has no heart, no soul, no sentiment—if she has she refuses to admit it," says Frank X. Leyendecker, one of the best-known artists and illustrators in the country.

"You do not dare to talk to the flapper of classics nor of other serious things," he continued, "for she simply will make no attempt to absorb them. She is idle, frivolous and heedless of tomorrow. However, I will admit that she is charming and often irresistible."

"She looks so young but knows so much—much that she could do well not to know. She assumes no responsibility. She seeks nothing but amusement. When a boy reaches the 'flapper' age he usually has some obligation to fulfill. He gets a job, or else he is branded as a loafer. The girl, however, spends her time reading frothy literature and smoking."

"In my opinion the only hope of the nation rests upon the working girl. She has more originality and individuality than the flapper, who looks to me as if she were made from a die. Each working girl has her particular style in clothes and coiffure."

"But the flapper! How can you tell one from another? The only danger from the working girl is that she is apt to become so self-reliant that she will scorn the help of mere man. But that danger is not so probable that any 'flapper' should be afraid to reform and become a working girl."
