DOG OWNERS WARNED BY OHIO POSTAL OFFICIALS

LIMA, Ohio, June 10.—Dogs play an important and often an exciting part in the life of a postman, says George F. Winemiller, superintendent of Lima mails. Cases in which dogs along the mail route have bitten carriers are not infrequent.

"Perhaps it is the uniform or the pack on his back that he carries, for dogs usually have an innate hatred of peddlers," Winemiller says.

In case a man is bitten the postmaster notifies the owner of the dog that no mail will be delivered until the dog is disposed. Under postal laws a carrier need not deliver mail where there is a vicious dog.

COW KICKED TO DEATH BY INFURIATED HORSE

FAIRMONT, W. Va., June 10.—A friendship that existed for years between a horse and a cow owned by Joseph Fortney, of Antioch, came to a fatal ending when the cow was kicked to death by the horse. The accident is regarded as a queer freak of nature by the people of that community.

The cow, a fine Jersey, had been pastured in the same field with the horse and there seemed to exist a strong friendship between them. Often they would be seen grazing very close to each other and they would follow each other around the field.

Members of the Fortney family saw the cow go near the horse, as was her custom, and were horrified to see the horse turn his heels on his companion and literally kick her brains out.

The cow was a favorite of the owner, who buried her despite the advice of neighbors to sell her for her hide and beef.

AIR SERVICE OFFICER HOLDS VARIOUS TITLES

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The most titled officer in the United States army, according to the war department, is the officer in charge of the trade test department of the Chautauque Field, Illinois, air service mechanics school.

An army official declared if this officer had a tin badge pinned on his chest for every title he has the admiring public would require a powerful microscope to discover his noble physiognomy beneath the mass of metal. A few of the titles which burden him with their weight are: Officer in charge of trade test, officer, information officer, athletic officer, publicity officer, morale officer, member of G. C. M., secretary of officers' club, engineering officer and transportation officer of the Fifteenth observation squadron.

With all his titles he is the lowest ranking member of the school's staff. Clayton N. Ingle of La Grande, a member in the engineering department of the University of Oregon, will leave soon for South Africa, where he will work locating a railroad in Upper Cape Town.

FIRE-WORKS ARE BANNED IN OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—(P.)—Oregon will be without fire crackers this Fourth of July. Days when young patriots stood bravely by the side of "giant stars" to observe at first hand the phenomena of their disintegration under the stress of exploding powder have gone, never to return.

All because the state dads, in legislation assembled, passed an act during the 1921 session, and which became effective January 1, of this year, banning firecrackers, rockets, torpedoes, blank cartridges, caps, Roman candles, pistols, canes, and all sundry and diverse forms of explosives and pyrotechnics heretofore indissolubly associated with the celebration of the day when John Hancock took his pen in hand.

Not only is the use of these things forbidden, but their possession as well. The state fire marshal is empowered by the act to confiscate and remove for appropriate destruction whenever these appetenances in the old time glorious Fourth are found within the state of Oregon. The youth of the state, however, are permitted to stand by and marvel at whatever municipal display of fireworks the cities and towns of Oregon may see fit to stage on the day in question.
