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### ALLIES IN A COMMON CAUSE

REPORTS in railroad circles are to the effect that the Great Northern railroad is being forced to electrify because of competition from the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul. The "Milwaukee" is electrified over considerable of its mileage and the service rendered is universally praised. Travel over that line is swifter than on the steam lines and is free from smoke and cinders. Naturally people patronize such a line.

The electrified road is also in better position to handle freight at a profit. Data given here over a year ago by an official of the Milwaukee shows that one electric locomotive does the work of three steam locomotives. That means a lower operating cost and such reductions make lower rates permissible.

The time is coming when all northwestern railroads will be operated by means of hydro electric power. White coal is the natural fuel for our railroads because it is abundant here and is now going to waste. It is inevitable that it will be harnessed and put to use. Portland cannot afford to see electrified railroads running into Seattle from the east and not have the O-W. R. & N. electrified also. To keep up with the pace the O-W. also needs to modernize.

In the task of promoting development of the Umatilla rapids project so as to make a vast amount of hydro electric power available for transportation uses as well as for other purposes Portland and the O-W. R. & N. company are natural allies with Eastern Oregon. It is their project as much as it is our own.

### WANT TO RESTORE RHEIMS

THE American Legion national headquarters, cooperating with the French authorities, is requesting every member of the American Expeditionary Forces who may have carried away a fragment of historic Rheims cathedral, in France as a souvenir, to send it back to Rheims.

Battered into a mass of debris by German guns, Rheims cathedral, following the armistice, was a mecca for souvenir hunters. Thousands of members of the A. E. F. visited the ruins and, French authorities declare, many carried away pieces of statuary and other elements of the fabric of the old cathedral. Parts of the stately edifice, put in place hundreds of years ago and sacred to every French heart, were priceless.

The reconstruction efforts are aimed toward replacing all former portions that can be recovered. The French people hold that it is an insult to Christianity and to the French nation for individuals to retain bits of the cathedral as souvenirs, according to Maurice Barres, member of the Chamber of Deputies and the French Academy, and leader of the campaign to collect all available pieces.

"It is time that souvenir collectors understood that this or that fragment of Rheims cathedral is a vital part of the organism of the cathedral and that organism seeks reconstruction," said M. Barres.

Many fragments have already been returned, he says in his open letter to America, and it is to further this cause that the Legion is making its appeal to the former doughboys.

### VETERANS FROM NINE STATES WILL GATHER

SEATTLE, June 12.—Inquiries concerning the reunion of the 91st Division association to be held in Seattle August 19 and 20 are pouring into headquarters from nine Western States, according to O. W. Schmitz, chairman of the reunion committee.

Members of the famous "wild west" division in California, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, Wyoming, Nevada, Utah and many places in the State of Washington are flooding headquarters with requests for information about the forthcoming reunion. In response to these inquiries, chairman Schmitz is sending out approximately 10,000 circular letters to members of the association containing detailed information on railroad and hotel rates, and a schedule of the entertainment features to be held in Seattle and Tacoma.

With the 91st Division battle cry, "Powder River, let 'er buck!" emblazoned across the top, an attractive poster advertising the reunion is being broadcasted over the Ninth Corps area. Railroads operating in this territory are cooperating with the reunion committee and their traffic departments are sending out the posters to be displayed in all depots and ticket offices.

With material reductions in railroad passenger fares and improved economic conditions, a record breaking attendance is expected and chairman Schmitz. Last year the reunion brought approximately 10,000 former fighting men of the 91st division to Los Angeles and with improved general conditions, upwards to 12,000 visitors are expected to invade Seattle for the reunion this year.

The 23rd annual encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will be held in Seattle during the same week in August and the two great gatherings are expected to bring 30,000 delegates and visitors to the north-west metropolis.

President Harding has accepted an invitation to be in Seattle during the reunion and encampment and if advised by the department of agriculture in transmitting to farmers weather, crops and market news, according to department officials here.

Lieutenant Governor W. J. Coyle, president of the 91st Division association will go to San Francisco on June 26 to address members of the association who will be in the Golden Gate City as delegates and visitors to the national convention of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War. President Coyle will tell of the preparations made by Seattle to entertain the "wild west" division and he will be an honor guest at a tremendous banquet and reception to be staged in the civic auditorium in San Francisco.

### CHINESE SLAYER GETS CLEMENCY FROM COURT

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Liang Song Wang, Chinese student, convicted of killing Ben Sen Wu, an under secretary to the Chinese Educational Mission, in January, 1919, will not be executed until November 17 next.

Justice McCoy, presiding in the Criminal Court here, granted the Chinese youth the stay because of an appeal pending before the Court of Appeals. He was to have been executed June 2.
