RUINS OF ROMAN CITY SEEN BY WORKING MEN

PARIS, June 13.—Glimpses of a Roman city, buried far under ground, but in many details perfectly preserved—tombs, sculptures, columns and entire buildings—were caught by workmen rebuilding the fallen city of Amiens.

Scientists and students, their attention called, grew warm with enthusiasm. "You must excavate further!" they cried.

Sheep Company Incorporates.

He was graduated last year from Pendleton high school and is keenly interested in the dairy business.

Just how many times Lincoln was placed on the stage before the world was given John Drinkwater's masterpiece "Abraham Lincoln," which William Harris, Jr. will present at the Rivoli Theatre, Friday evening, June 16th will probably never be known. But there are records of some of the plays either in book form or as given in stage performance. The first one of record is dated 1852 on the title page. It was written by S. D. Carpenter and its title is "The Irrepressible Conflict." One year later the Metropolitan Record of New York published "The Administrative Telegraph" author not given. As early as 1865 Lincoln's whole career was covered in drama form in a German work with the inclusive title of "Lincoln, Auggang, Quick and Ende." Then there is the play produced in Munichhausen in Alsace Lorraine in 1866 written by M. Reuter and entitled "La Vie et La Mort d'Abraham Lincoln." This drama was so utterly false that it received only one production.

Other plays of record are Stephen W. Downey's "The Play of Destiny," 1847; "A National Drama," printed in "The Beautiful World for July 1872; "The Tragedy of Abraham Lincoln" credited to "An American Artist" and published in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1876; "Madam Surtratt" by J. W. Rogers, 1878; "J. Wilkes Booth, or The National Tragedy" by W. A. Libby, 1880; "The Tragedy of Abraham Lincoln" by S. Whitaker Grove, 1881; "Abraham Lincoln," a drama, by P. S. Hereford, undated, and "Abraham Lincoln," a Historical Drama, by McKee Rankin and Archibald Forbes, 1892.

Then there were, too, the graphic sketches by Benjamin Chapin who played long vaudeville engagements and, following fast on the success of Dr. Dixon produced a play of similar import which had a short engagement in Chicago and a briefer and even more unlucky one in New York. A condensation of the last named play is now being acted in vaudeville and should not be confused with John Drinkwater's play in which Frank McGlynn will appear here as Lincoln.

Professor Hyslop called attention to several problems and developments in Oregon agriculture which farmers face. Among other things he called attention to the fact that Peruvian alfalfa has failed to show the requisite hardiness to withstand Oregon winters. He advocates the seeding of as much pure Grimm as possible, and urges that careful attention be paid by farmers to clean cutting and making to avoid blighting. The examination of wheat for certification will be called for by farmers this season more than ever before. He suggested that all Federation and Hard Federation fields eligible to certification be entered. He predicts a keen demand for certified seed of these two varieties.

Bennion reported the recent conference at Portland between wheat growers and the dealers. More station was inspected by the members of the conference, and D. E. Stephens discussed briefly the data used in Bulletin No. 190 which is being published by the state. Stephens and Prof. Hyslop are the co-authors of the bulletin.

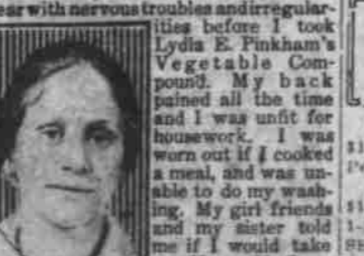
