HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES

- Farm Menu**
 - Breakfast—Fruit, cereal, creamed dried beef, poached eggs, potato cakes, hot biscuits, jelly, coffee, milk.
 - Suggestions—Immediately after breakfast put the beans on to cook and when parboiled once, divide and prepare half for baked beans and allow the remainder to cook with the pork until tender.
 - Make cottage cheese.
 - Prepare the baked apples for supper.
 - Dinner—Pork, apple sauce, rice, boiled beans, boiled cabbage, fresh onions, corn bread, bread, caramel custard ice cream, coffee.
 - Suggestions—Caramel custard ice cream is made by combining 3 cups of milk, 2 eggs or 4 yolks, 1 1/2 cups sugar (1-2 caramelized) and making a steamed custard. When this is cooled, add 3 cups and cream and freeze. This may be made early in the morning and packed.
 - Extra rice should be cooked and all that is left from dinner should be put into a can and molded ready to slice for breakfast.
 - The cabbage should be boiled long enough to make it tender—about twenty-five minutes. If cooked a long time it becomes dark in color and strong in flavor.
 - Supper—German fried potatoes, baked beans, cottage cheese, corn bread, bread, baked apples, whipped cream, tea, milk.
 - Suggestions—Put breakfast cereal in fireless cooker—V. D.

BERLIN, June 13.—(U. P.)—Despite the fact that Germany's potato crop last year amounted to more than 22,000,000 tons, Germany was forced this spring to import potatoes from Estonia.

of potatoes to feed the entire population of Germany. However, the largest part of both crop and imports were used to manufacture spirits.

PARIS STREETS SOON TO GET MODERN PAVEMENTS

PARIS, June 13.—Jolting down the grand boulevards of Paris in omnibus or motor car soon will be a thing of the past. Even the hardest-boiled Parisian taxi drivers won't be able to jounce his passenger one single bounce. Reason is that the city of Paris is planning to replace cobble stones with modern paving on most of the principal thoroughfares. The work is scheduled to be finished in October and will cost half a million dollars.

WINNIPEG, Man., June 13.—(U. P.)—During the three prairie provinces of Western Canada scored a high-water mark of prosperity last year. Manitoba's dairy production was valued at \$12,589,431. The total amount of creamery butter from 58 creameries of Saskatchewan during 1921 was 7,085,562 pounds valued at \$2,609,410. In Alberta in 1921, the production of creamery butter was 12,500,000 pounds, according to Chris Marker, dairy commissioner.

RUSSIANS GOING HOME TO LIVE UNDER SOVIET

SA FRANCISCO, June 13.—(U. P.)—Organized into the "California Commune," and furnished with resources of "base" capitalistic cash totaling more than \$100,000 as a result of pooling their accumulated savings, over 400 Russians now residing on the Pacific Coast are preparing to leave for Soviet Russia during the next six months.

The emigrants have been granted a tract of 7,500 acres of land near Moscow by the Soviet government. They will work it as communal property, and finance their operations and their trip to Russia out of the \$100,000 funds.

In consideration of the migration, and on stipulation that they cultivate the tract, the Soviet government has agreed that the land shall be tax-free for eight years.

Members of the "California Commune" will sail for Russia in two contingents, the first on June 30, and the second on January 1.

The first contingent is already composed of San Francisco Russians, now living in the colony on Russian Hill. This group has already purchased four large American tractors, and a number of other pieces of farm machinery.

There are 58 families in the first contingent, numbering about 200 persons.

The second contingent will be composed largely of Russians from Portland, Seattle, Vancouver, Chico, Los Angeles and scattered towns.

The original plan was to obtain only colonists with families, but a number of young Russians have joined, planning to take brides after their arrival in Russia. In Vancouver 13 unmarried young Russians joined the colony, contributing \$26,000 to the pool.

An agreement has been signed by the members whereby the colony will be governed according to communistic laws. The property will be owned in common, and distribution of crops and receipts made on that basis.
