The records, incomplete in detail, reveal something like twenty plays with Lincoln either as the hero or central figure. Of the twenty only John Drinkwater's "Abraham Lincoln" has won its public. Strange as it may seem, the first success of the Drinkwater play was found in England, and then repeated in Lincoln's own America, and it will come to the Rivolt tonight. As played by Frank McGlynn in the Drinkwater drama Lincoln is the outstanding figure. In other plays he is brought in by inference or as a supporting character and even then his grip on the imagination of the people has almost always been very evident. This free use of Lincoln by dramatists is perhaps the best illustration that he dealt with elemental things. Drama, to be successful, must deal with elementals—the things which are a part of every-day life and which all people will very easily recognize.

Lincoln never had time except for the primitive matters of the world. His reading as a youth was the Bible and that book is crammed with character and action—like the pride factors in drama. Lincoln held the leading role in one of the epic dramas of all history. His picturesque debates in the stirring prelude of that drama, and the soul-stirring climax at Ford's Theater, all have a sweep which would have appealed irresistibly to Shakespeare. It is not that surprising to find that so many plays with Lincoln as the leading character have been written and staged before Mr. Drinkwater brought his book to the task which achieved this sympathetic success.

That not one of those twenty plays have survived is due to the workmen, not the material. Today the Civil War has just reached the correct perspective for literary treatment. Drinkwater, in England had the vision of little somer and less hurried so that he produced the great play "Abraham Lincoln." More plays will be written in the future but it is safe to assume that none will be more impressive than this drama, which first saw performance in Birmingham. And there will be no finer or truer definition of the man that that given by Frank McGlynn who will be seen on the local stage when William Harris Jr. sends "Abraham Lincoln" for its engagement here.
