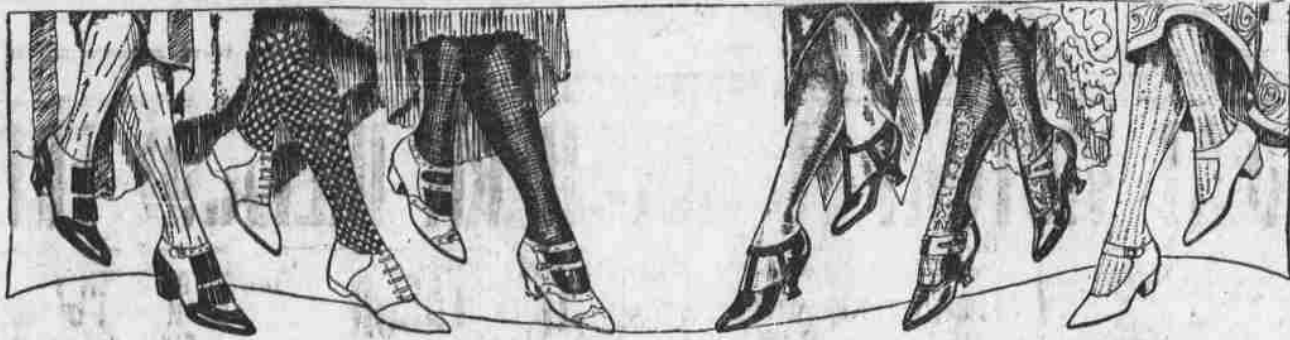

MILLER VS. HEARST IS LINEUP EXPECTED IN NEW YORK STATE

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) ALBANY, N. Y., June 19.—(U. P.)—Political observers at New York state's capitol today were more than ever convinced that the state ticket this fall will be Miller vs. Hearst.

They are basing this conclusion on two things:

First, that Republican party chiefs are determined that the present governor, Nathan L. Miller, shall run to succeed himself, in the hope of grooming him for presidential timber if he is elected.

Second, that William Randolph Hearst has the Democratic nomination sewed up in his pocket, if he cares to take it, and according to every indication here, he wants it.

It has been learned on credible authority that the Republican party managers have decided that Miller must be the G. O. P. candidate, whether he wishes it or not. The plan of the leaders at present is to trot out all aspirants for the gubernatorial nomination, killing them all off one by one, and the last minute in the convention nominate Miller.

Miller's record has been attracting nationwide attention and it has been gratifying to some of his party leaders to note that he has been mentioned as a presidential possibility by editors outside of the state. This has inspired them with the belief that he will be a serious consideration at the next G. O. P. national convention if he is elected and it is decided that Harding shall be retired.

On the other side of the political fence two factors point very strongly to the fact that Hearst desires the Democratic nomination. The first is the significant fact that practically the same men are fostering his candidacy up-state as did in 1906. The second is that Hearst is believed to think that if he can capture the election this year, he will be in position to command attention when he puts forward his claim for consideration as the Democratic presidential nominee 2 years hence.

This latter is said to be by those who know him, Hearst's one big ambition—to try for the presidential chair. He is credited with reasoning that if he can be elected governor of New York state, then he is the logical man to be Democracy's standard bearer.

The one interesting feature of the Democratic situation this year is the aloofness of Tammany Hall. No word has yet come from the Fourteenth street wigwag as to who would be acceptable to them, but here is the situation as it appears here.

Under the new convention law, Tammany Hall will have a majority of delegates to the state convention. Hearst is counted on to control Mayor John P. Hyland, who in turn, though patronage of his disposal, is the controlling influence in Tammany at the present time. If Hearst says he wants the nomination, Hyland will see that Tammany delivers the necessary votes at the convention, it is believed here.

Hearst's booming of Hyland for the nomination here is taken as camouflage.

According to information reaching here, Al Smith, former governor, is not being given serious consideration because of a reported break between C. F. Murphy, Tammany leader, due in part to Smith's action in supporting some of the measures of Gov. Miller. While this break has not become so serious as to become open, it is known that the former governor is no longer the confidant of Murphy.

Interest in the gubernatorial situation is the all-absorbing topic at the present time, and overshadows the possible makeup of the rest of the ticket to such an extent that little thought is given to the latter.

Should Hearst take the Democratic nomination for governor, then it is believed that Martin H. Glynn will be the choice for U. S. senator. The two are close personal friends, and Glynn has supported Hearst to a noticeable degree in his newspaper, the Times Union, in Albany.

But there is apt to be some insurgency, as George B. Lunn, of Schenectady, is also seeking one of these nominations, and unless he can be persuaded to take something else, he is apt to bolt the ticket and make it uncomfortable in a general way all around.

PEACE RIVER, Alberta.—That the Peace River country is capable of producing more wheat than the record production to date in the whole of western Canada, is a statement made by the managing director of the Edmonton Journal, who has been touring the country. He further stated he had seen vegetables and flowers at Fort Vermilion, 600 miles north of Edmonton, equal to anything he had seen in the gardens of Ontario. Wheat yields 50 and 60 bushels to the acre were common.

ASTORIA FISHERMEN ON WAY TO RUSSIA

ASTORIA, June 19.—Fifty Finnish residents of Astoria are on their way to New York, the first leg of their journey to Soviet Russia and "freedom." They will establish a fishing colony on the Arctic shores of the tumultuous republic, John Antilla, one of their number, an Astoria fisherman for many years, having been appointed by Lenin superintendent of fisheries for Northern Russia.

The way was prepared for the return of the 56 last year when John Antilla and John Anttila, first to Russia to investigate the fisheries of the northern coast. It was upon the recommendations of these two men that the party was organized. Most of the men in the group are fishermen and had followed that profession here for 20 years, many of them. Some few have made a thorough study of the processes of preparing and marketing fish.

The plan of action is to operate a cannery at Kem, on the White Sea, and the plant has been purchased in Seattle and is being shipped to Russia, where it is understood, a building has already been erected to house it. The same ship which transports the machinery is to stop here to take on a supply of nets and fishing

material for the party. The little group, which left here in two special coaches, with a baggage car, for New York, where they will ship for Riga, to complete their journey to Kem by rail, had long expressed a desire to return to Russia with a view to practicing their theories of sociology in a communist land. They had long been regarded here as the nucleus of the Astoria radical group.

Many of the members of the little colony to be are children. Many women were said to have been hesitant about trying their fortunes in a strange land. The men, however, anxious to practice what they have preached here, and eager to try their craftsmanship upon the wary fish of the White Sea, overruled all opposition.

PORTLAND GIVES REIN TO FESTIVE SPIRIT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19.—(U. P.)—Portland has taken on its preliminary festival appearance with the arrival of six destroyers ordered here for the Rose Festival, June 26 to 28, inclusive. The destroyers dropped anchor here, Saturday, and the jockies came ashore for the celebration.

The battleship Connecticut, stationed at San Pedro, is chaperoning the six little bulldogs. Commander G. L. P. Stone commanding. Rear Admiral Chase of the Pacific fleet is the ranking officer of the little flotilla. The arrival of the battleships and destroyers is a customary feature of the Rose Festival, about the only time when warcraft make their way up the river to Portland. Officers and men are to be feted as the guests of the city during their stay.

EDMONTON, Alberta.—With a capitalization of \$5,000,000, and holding a Dominion charter, the Canadian Petroleum, Limited, has been registered for the carrying on of petroleum development in Alberta. Active operations will be carried on in the Peace River country, and the prospective oil fields to the north of that this summer.

CALIFORNIA VETERANS PLAN FOR BIG TURNOUT

SEATTLE, June 19.—California plans to send a bigger delegation to the reunion of the Ninety First Division Association to be held here August 19 and 20 than at all of the other eight states in the ninth corps area combined, according to word received at reunion headquarters from James I. Herz, secretary of the association at San Francisco.

In a letter to O. W. Schmitt, director of the reunion committee here, secretary Herz states that more than 9,000 letters have been sent out to the members of the association in California. More than 3,000 Californians have signified their intention of invading Seattle and two steamers will be chartered to bring the San Francisco contingent, according to Secretary Herz's letter.

SASKATOON, Sask.—Indians of the Far North will have their first view of an airplane this month, when Lieut. H. S. McClelland, Saskatoon aviator, flies to Mistawasis, Saskatchewan, as part of the program arranged for a treaty day celebration. Indians on the Cree Reserve, east of Iniquity Lake, will receive their treaty money about the middle of this month, and have engaged the aviator to take them sky-riding.
