HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES

Strawberry Preserves.
None but freshly-picked berries should be preserved. Practically the same methods are to be followed in the preserving of all berries. Berries should be gathered in shallow trays or baskets, and not in deep vessels which allow them to be trampled and crushed. They should be uniform, ripe, and sound; only large firm berries should be selected for preserving. All berries should be carefully sorted and lightly washed by placing in colander and pouring water over them rather than by putting them into a pan of water.
Recipe No. 1.
(Especially fancy pack but not as economical as recipe No. 2 since a considerable amount of extra syrup is usually left over to be canned separately.)
2 pounds whole berries.
1-2 pounds sugar.
1 pint berry juice.

WESTERN MINING MEN MEET AT DENVER

DENVER, Colo., June 21.—(U. P.)—More than 100 leading mine and smelter operators gathered here today for the Western Mining conference, called by the American Mining Congress. Representatives from Colorado, Washington, California, Nevada, Idaho, Arizona, New Mexico, Montana, Utah, Oklahoma, Missouri, South Dakota, Wyoming and Oregon as well as Mexico, Canada and Alaska are here. The principal objects of the meeting are:
First—To take steps for the rehabilitation of the western mining industry.
Second—to regulate the output of silver in the United States, Mexico, Canada and Alaska.
Third—To take action in opposition to proposed blue sky legislation and revision of certain federal mining laws.
Just now, the mining industry in the West is beginning to emerge from a long period of depression and the conference hopes to bring about united action on the part of operators to further stimulate activity in metal mining and bring it back to its former place among the leading industries of the country.

DALTON, Ga., June 21.—Effie Jones, midnight in color, superlatively round as to girth and a female Florian Slappee as to sartorial appointments, recently removed from Co-hutta, Ga., to Dalton and, without formal introduction to many of the social leaders in the dining car and Jullman belt of Dalton, struck out on a course that has left her among the sensationally famous of this district.

Effie, without blowing a horn, sending out announcements, or anything, walked right into the Baptist Church here, while colored brethren and sisters sat in open-mouthed astonishment and envy, wearing a suit of knickerbockers.

Effie sphyred through the front door, paraded down the aisle—no mean aisle, may it be said—and then crossed over in front of the pulpit, while the congregation hid down songbooks and forgot the chicken for dinner. She had on gray knickerbockers and silk stockings. Around her ample bosom there was draped a silk shirt—regular silk shirt—the striped, stick-candy kind. Around her neck there was a high starched—and also striped—stiff collar, and a man's necktie dangled from it. Effie's crowning glory was a sport cap.

Effie reached her seat in absolute silence, but a whoop resounded as she sat down. For a time the service was threatened with riot, but the minister saved the day and Effie by beginning his sermon. And his sermon certainly was an interesting one, for he told the congregation all about his travels and the styles he had seen, bringing the speech to a climax by announcing that never, never had he seen such styles as women were wearing.

HIGH COST OF GAS AROUSES WRATH OF GOTHAM CONSUMERS

NEW YORK, June 21.—It is possible that New York City, having the finest rapid transit systems in the world, the "last word" in most public utilities and consumption capacity whose very size should guarantee the "quantity production" theory of economy, possesses "the most antique method in America" of producing common illuminating gas?

This is the charge made by the City Parliament of Community Councils, in asking Governor Miller to "fire the chairman and the other four members of the public service commission."


The irate consumers declare that in spite of the fact that gas is manufactured on a large scale, materials are purchased in larger quantities and all other conditions are at least equal to those of other cities, the price of gas in New York is far in excess of that charged in most other municipalities in the United States—in some cases being almost twice as much.

The community council members allege that the basic discrepancy in the New York process is the employment of the twenty-two-candlepower unit, which, they aver, was adopted primarily for the purpose of furnishing gas for lighting purposes. With the advent of electricity, they argue, and the development of the gas mantle in such places where gas is still used for lighting the use of gas for heating and cooking purposes has become paramount. Because of this they argue the adoption of the British thermal unit—the basic employed in thirty-five states of the Union.

Statisticians have figured out that not more than 10 per cent of the gas consumed in this city is for illuminating purposes.

The protesting groups have hinted strongly at partiality by the commission members to the interests of large oil concerns, from whom basic supplies are purchased by the gas companies.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The existence of the Islands in the Pacific reported to have been discovered by an American pleasure craft recently, and which are said by the Navy Hydrographic office to be Washington and Palmyra Islands, was known more than a century ago, according to the National Geographic Society headquarters here.
Palmyra Island, which has no inhabitants, was discovered 129 years ago by the American ship Palmyra, while Washington Islands, where slightly more than one hundred persons reside, was found in 1791, the society asserts.
