Harrison Hale and grandson were in town Tuesday from Texas Bar Basin.

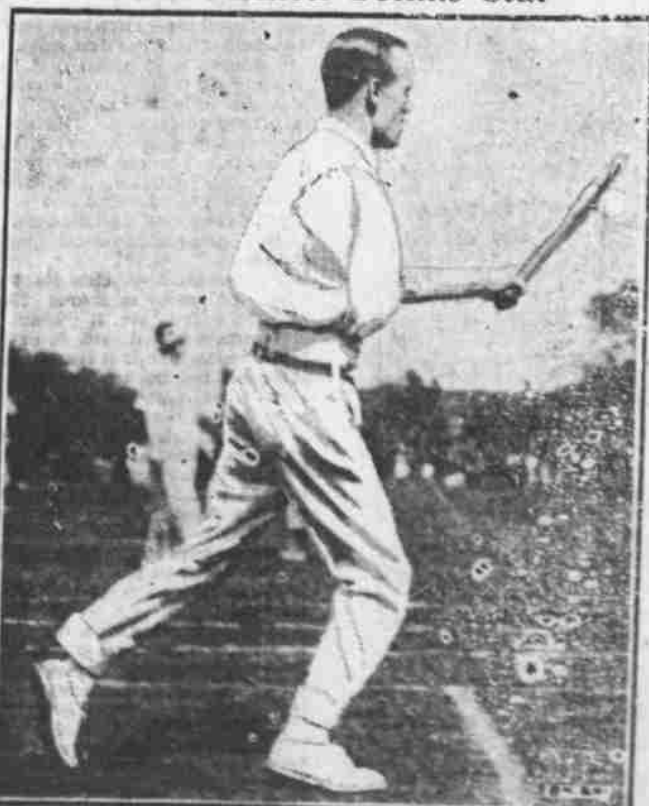
George Ness and son Forest are delivering wood to the telephone office. Willis Noland and Miss Nellie Anderson visited at Halfway Springs Sunday.

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AGGIE COACH WILL GUIDE BOYS ON HIKE

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, June 22.—Coach "Bob" Hager of the department of physical education of the college, will spend his fourth summer as supervisor and guide of hiking tours for boys at Glacier National Park. Coach Hager spent one summer as transportation manager for the Great Northern Railway company at Many Glaciers hotel in the center of the park, acting as information man to the thousands who visit the national playground.

The boys' hiking party will be limited to 20 boys from 15 to 19 years of age, and will leave Portland by the Great Northern, August 15. The entire tour from the western entrance of the park until the party reaches the park hotel will be made on foot, except for two short launch rides across Lake MacDonald and St. Mary's lake, and an auto trip of 25 miles from the foot of Mary's lake to the hotel. All meals will be cooked in the open camp style by members of the party and everyone will sleep out doors. The entire trip will take 17 days, 14 of which will be spent in the park.
