DEMPSEY IS TOLD TO FIGHT OR QUIT

NEW YORK, June 24.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, has 17 days in which formally to accept the challenge of Harry Wills, negro, for a bout for the title or have his crown put up for competition in New York state.

The decision was reached by the New York boxing commission today as a part of the campaign started earlier in the week to force titleholders in every division to meet capable contenders or quit and start all over again. Two champions, Johnny Kilbane of the featherweights and Johnny Wilson of the middleweights, have been shorn of their crowns so far as the Empire state is concerned.

Negotiations are under way. Dempsey's manager, Jack Kearns, has been here yesterday. Upon his arrival here yesterday Jack Kearns, the champion's manager, went into conference with Tex Rickard, promoter and Frank Flounoy, matchmaker, and it was announced that a tentative agreement had been reached, a definite contract to be signed when a site was selected for the match.

"I think that everything will be finished before July 15, the date the commission has set," Frank Flounoy said. The battle may be waged in New York state, he added.

Problem Is Presented
Boxing followers here tonight were asking what would happen if Dempsey accepted Wills' challenge and Rickard were to attempt to hold the match. An official of the commission said that issuance of the ultimatum to Dempsey does not tacitly give that body's permission to hold a mixed bout in this state and that the commission "won't cross that bridge until it comes to it."

If the two are matched, however, Dempsey will be permitted to go through with whatever bouts he has already arranged, but he will not be allowed to enter into a boxing contract until after he has disposed of the Wills challenge, this official said.

Willard Greatly Pleased
LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 24.—Indignation over the action of the New York state athletic commission in setting July 15 as a time limit for Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion to accept or decline the challenge of Harry Wills, was expressed here today by Jess Willard, ex-champion, who has challenged Dempsey to a return bout.

Willard says he fails to see why the commission ignored his challenge completely in issuing its ultimatum to Dempsey.

"I have held the world's heavyweight title," he said, "and I think that entitles me to consideration ahead of Wills. I have openly challenged Dempsey but no recognition of this seems to have been taken by the New York boxing commission, while the challenge of Wills has been officially recognized."

Willard also said that he has received no reply from Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, concerning his challenge and repeated that it was his conviction that Dempsey was trying to "sidestep" him.

RED, WHITE AND BLUE IN EVIDENCE FOR VETS

Many of the national officers and national executive committeemen of the big organization of America's wounded and disabled heroes have arrived for the convocation, a stirring locale everywhere for the hundreds of veterans, many of them carrying their permanent apparent disabilities, as a grim token of their endeavors in the recent great war.

Fish Flags Made Hit With The Japanese

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) TOKYO, (By mail to United Press).—When Ambassador Warren flew three fish flags above the American Embassy here not long ago friendly feeling for the United States took another upward swing.

The Japanese liked it. The papers and the people talked it. They regarded it as a subtle and gracious gesture—small enough of itself, but significant of a sympathetic spirit—and that appeals more to the Japanese than anything else.

For several reasons Ambassador Warren has become among the Japanese one of the most liked and trusted foreign diplomats. When Japanese newspaper men want to see him they can do so without delay or red tape and get quick, straight, frank information to their questions. Consequently, the picture of Warren and of American viewpoints reflected in the newspapers here to the Japanese people have been favorable.

No less important is the reputation the American ambassador has established among the highest Japanese officials and diplomats as a "frank, candid, on-the-table gentleman."

But about the fish flags. Annually in Japan on the day of the "Boys' Festival"—a most important day in the calendar of celebrations here—great cloth "fish" float above every Japanese home that boasts a boy—one for each boy in the family. The cloth devices are painted very realistically to resemble carp. They are hollow. They are attached, by strings through the gills, to high bamboo poles, and as they fly over wind and wave against the breeze, they seem astonishingly real—like great fish moved by some magic. Above many houses there are strings of half a dozen or more of these proud symbols during the Boys' Festival.
