DEPUTY MARSHALS GIVE RINGOLD'S WORK PRAISE

Praise for the work of Fire Chief W. E. Ringold, a resume of conditions in Pendleton as far as fire hazards are concerned, and recommendations of changes are included in the report of the deputy fire marshals to the state marshal on the survey which was made here this spring. The report in chief is as follows:

"This report is intended to supplement the report of the former survey made in April, 1920, and to show changes or improvements made since that time.

"At the present time Pendleton covers an area of about five square miles, has an assessed valuation of \$7,000,000 and is paying tax levy of .03775.

"The average annual fire loss for the last six years is \$2.56 based on the figures of the new census. The bulk of the loss occurred in three large fires.

"There is no change in the general existing conditions. The city is quite free of rubbish and ashes, due to the good work of the fire chief.

"The elevation of the city above sea level is 1070 feet. The climatic conditions tend to extremes of temperature, dryness and frequent winds. For the year 1920 the maximum temperature was 103 degrees, minimum 2 degrees, Fahrenheit. The rainfall was 16 inches, the prevailing wind from the west.

Summary of Inspections.

"24 defective wiring; 86 rubbish and trash; 8 floors and walls unprotected from above; 1 exposed and unprotected opening; 2 metal cans ordered for safe disposal; 2 gasoline kept in unsafe manner; 5 defective pipes, stoves or fires; 5 drip pans for water not ordered; 2 without proper fire escapes; 5 without proper fire exit signs and lights; 41 chimneys found on brackets; 12 places where "No Smoking" signs mailed; 74 fire extinguishers ordered; 6 metal cans for ashes ordered; 3 places where kegs of sand ordered; 2 exits insufficient or blocked; 5 buildings should be razed; 3 brick chimneys recommended.

Water Source of Supply.

"The water supply is taken from Thora Hollow and Schapish springs, 17 and 20 miles respectively, east of Pendleton. From each spring a vitrified pipe is laid fourteen feet under ground and covered with gravel. The pipes from these springs join into an eighteen inch cast pipe 1300 feet long from this point a reinforced concrete pipe twenty-eight to eighteen inches in size leads to distributing well adjacent to reservoirs. The pipe is laid in sections joined with cement bond. It traverses uneven ground, mostly through cultivated fields. The maximum head is ninety feet. The flowing capacity is 5,000,000 gallons a day.

"Careful inspection showed the pipe line to be in good condition with but slight possibility of injury from natural or other sources. The supply is adequate for present needs and can be somewhat increased by other springs not in use at the present.

"Two concrete reservoirs of 1,000,000 gallons each are located at an elevation of 240 feet above the mercantile district, one quarter of a mile south of the city. The reservoirs are in first class condition, covered by substantial frame buildings and kept full at all times. From each there is a twenty inch cast iron discharge pipe, uniting in a single twenty inch cast iron main at a distance of 35 feet from the reservoir, which continues down Mill street to Tustin where it connects with the distributing system.

A single sixteen inch cast iron main from the distributing well by passes the reservoir and connects with the twenty inch discharge main 109 feet below the reservoirs. The reservoirs are connected with the distributing well by independent twelve inch cast iron pipes 40 feet in length.

"The distribution system is almost entirely a circulating system, the principal mains are as follows:

12 inch main on Thompson St. Alta to Water street.

12 inch main on Alta from Thompson street to 50 feet west of Main.

8 inch main on Vincent, Alta street to river.

10 inch main on Vincent, Bluff to Alta streets.

"This takes in all of business district. The residential districts are supplied by eight inch reducing to four and three inch mains. They are only seven dead ends in the entire system which are used for flushing.

"We recommend that the ordinance which is being prepared by the city attorney relative to building construction and fire prevention be enacted by the city council and provisions made for its enforcement. This is the most important provision that can be made by the city at this time for the purpose of safety from fire.

"We recommend that the water company install stand pipes at convenient locations for the use of the fire department and forbid the use of fire hydrants for any purpose other than the fighting of fire. The use of hydrants by the street cleaning department, by contractors and at a responsible for the defective condition of many of them.

"We recommend that the hydrants be carefully gone over and repaired and put in first class condition. The efficiency of the fire department is affected materially by the condition of the hydrants.

"In conclusion we desire to make acknowledgment of the service rendered to us by Fire Chief Ringold, also Water Superintendent Frank Hays. We also desire to express our gratitude to the courtesy and cooperation of the mayor, city recorder and the city press.

"We cannot conclude this report without expressing the hope that Pendleton may go forward to far better experience with fire than it has had in the past and we sincerely hope that city officials and every citizen will do their utmost that this may be so."

FORECAST ON TOMATOES

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Production of commercial tomatoes in Mississippi is forecast by the Department of agriculture at 2,227 cars of 350 crates each.

This is an increase of 215 cars over the production of last year.

'PERIL OF DRIFTING' SERMON BY HULING

"One of the most marked characteristics of our day is the widespread tendency to drift," Mr. Huling stated in his sermon last night at the Baptist church on "The Peril of Drifting." There are many causes of drifting, but the underlying one is that the warmth of the first love for Christ has been lost. If not revived, this loss will prove ruinous to the moral and spiritual life. There is a neil fascination about drifting and it gives the drifters a false sense of freedom. It is really slavery to Satan. The drifter is spiritually chloroformed and is incapable of god's call. Therefore we ought to give the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard lest at any time we drift away from them." Remember the longer you drift the farther you drift, and the farther you drift the harder it is to get back. Irregularity in one's religious life is the certain indication of drifting. Be regular and you will not drift.

BIGGEST BUILDING EVER MOVED IN U. S.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., June 26.—(U. P.)—The Traux hotel of this city, the largest and heaviest building ever moved, is now in the process of being transported across the street from its present site at Harrison and Warren streets, in the heart of Syracuse's downtown section.

The Traux is being moved to make way for Syracuse's newest hotel, the Syracuse, which it is said, will be the largest building of its kind between New York and Chicago.

The old hotel weighs 12,400,000 pounds. The building is 124 feet by 41 feet and 4 inches. It is four stories high.

While the building is being moved across the street every room will be occupied, the water will run and all of the stores on the ground floor will continue to do business.

Although the firm which is moving the hotel have moved buildings all over the world, they state that the Traux is the heaviest and largest building ever moved in this country.

THEORIES OF CONAN DOYLE ARE REFUTED BY FAMOUS SCHOLAR

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 26.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's lectures in the Academy of Music here on Spiritism are receiving pointed criticisms from prominent Philadelphians. Among others, an answer to his claims has come from Prof. Paul L. S. Johnson, one of the best known Biblical scholars in America.

He claims that "Spiritism is revamped ancient necromancy—current among all ancient heathen nations as a part of their religion"—and that "the spirit medium is the modern counterpart of the ancient heathen spirit-familiar and necromancer and of the less ancient Indian medicine man."

Prof. Johnson declares that his understanding of Spiritism is not only the teaching of the Bible on the subject, but is also corroborated by multitudes of reformed Spiritists, whose experiences with the spirits give "incontrovertible evidence that they are the devil's underlings—the fallen angels—paining themselves off as the dead."

"I agree with Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's intimation to the effect that he has not a soft head," declared Dr. Johnson. "On the contrary, he has an unusually full and level head and, better still, a good kind heart. It strikes me that he has only one empty lobe in his brain. This vacuum in his head is the absence of correct knowledge on the nature of the spirits with whom he communicates in spiritistic seances. This lack of knowledge on the subject, combined with his brilliant mind and kind heart, makes him an advocate of Spiritism."

Fails as Detective.

"Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, the author of the best detective story in existence, has failed completely as a detective; for the persons that he is investigating have completely deceived him as to their identity, plans and works, if the Bible is true in its teachings on the subject and if the testimony of multitudes of undeceived former Spiritists is to be accepted.

"Replying to the question, 'How has Conan Doyle been deceived as to the identity, plans and works of the spirits that he has been investigating?' I would say, according to the Bible—corroborated by the experience of multitudes of reformed spiritists—the spirits that appear in seances are not at all dead human beings, but fallen angels—devils or demons—who impersonate the dead. This is my reply to his request for an answer, as he claimed due, to his question as to the identity of his communicating spirits, the familiar spirits of the Bible.

"These demons are wonderfully intelligent, knowing all of us intimately, even in the minutest particulars that most of us think are completely secret from everybody except our loved dead and ourselves. They are also deeply deceitful, being the lying spirits of the Scriptures. They use their knowledge and cunning to palm themselves off as dead friends and relatives.

"Impersonate Our Friends"

"All of us know that when death severs us from loved ones there is left an aching void in our hearts, which yearns for the return of fellowship with the departed. The fallen angels, taking advantage of this longing, through Spiritism impersonate our friends and relatives the more thoroughly to gain influence over us to their advantage and our harm. The great success that they have achieved in this matter attests their wonderful knowledge of our lives and their almost unbelievable deceitfulness.

"The activity of fallen angels—demons—palm themselves off as our dead friends and relatives is what genuine Spiritism is—nothing more and nothing less. Thus Spiritism is simply revamped ancient necromancy, and the medium is the modern counterpart of the ancient spirit-familiar, necromancer and Indian medicine man.

"The question why the spirits that Conan Doyle has been investigating might not be his son, mother, etc., I would answer: According to the Bible and human experience the dead are dead, and therefore are unconscious; consequently they do not think, know, hear or feel—in a word, they neither do nor can do anything. They will remain in that unconscious state until the resurrection. Therefore they cannot communicate now with us. Hence, the spirits that claim they are our dead friends and relatives are lying spirits—the fallen angels."
