TRAP LINE 250 MILES LONG SET BY TRAPPERS

(East Oregonian Special.)

GUILLANE, June 28.—Mr. Elmer Williams of the Portland office of the Biological Survey has been in this district the last three days inspecting the trap lines of Archie McCampbell, government hunter, and assisting Mr. McCampbell in connecting his lines with those of the government trappers east and west of here. A trunk trap line is being set from near the head of the Umatilla river southwestward for one hundred and twenty-five miles. The line will be set along which the trappers will ride on return trips, thus making a continuous trap line two hundred and fifty miles in length. Branch lines will also be set into coyote country. Experienced trappers will be in charge of the systems. In the Gordan District will be in charge of Archie McCampbell and Harold Cabell.

Will Troxel and Homer Landers who are camped at Arbutle Mountain while clearing road were recently the hosts to a nocturnal visit from a beast of the forest, a lighted match revealed a porcupine. Equipped with a light and armed with a long handled shovel a palama charge was made by the hosts. The porcupine's head was broken; likewise the shovel handle.

A new road has been constructed to the lookout tree on the top of Arbutle Mountain. The construction of the lookout station has been temporarily delayed by the press of other work. It is planned to cut the top from a tree about sixty feet from the ground and construct a crow's nest of wood and steel. The lookout from the crow's nest will be able to overlook approximately three hundred thousand acres of forest land.

A new split log bridge has been constructed at Pole Creek, making the road between Ellis Ranger Station and Ditch Creek passable for horse drawn vehicles.

The Arbutle Mountain to Thompson Flat road is now clear of logs and while rough, is passable for cars on from Freezout Ridge southward to the crossing on Ellis Creek.

MONTREAL, Quebec.—A total of 50,551 tons of sugar has arrived in the port of Montreal since the harbor was opened in the spring, according to a report emanating from the office of the Harbor Commission. The sugar refining companies report a greater import and export of sugar this year than there was last year.

BOYS OUTRANK GIRLS IN DETROIT BIRTH FIGURES

DETROIT, Mich., June 28.—More
boy babies than girls were born in
Detroit during the last year. Figures
announced recently by the Depart-
ment of Health shows the ratio of
birth 107 males to 100 females. The
city's birth rate for the last twelve
months was 29 per thousand. The in-
fant mortality rate, based on the
number of babies born, indicates
deaths under one year of age at the
ratio of 34 to 1,000.

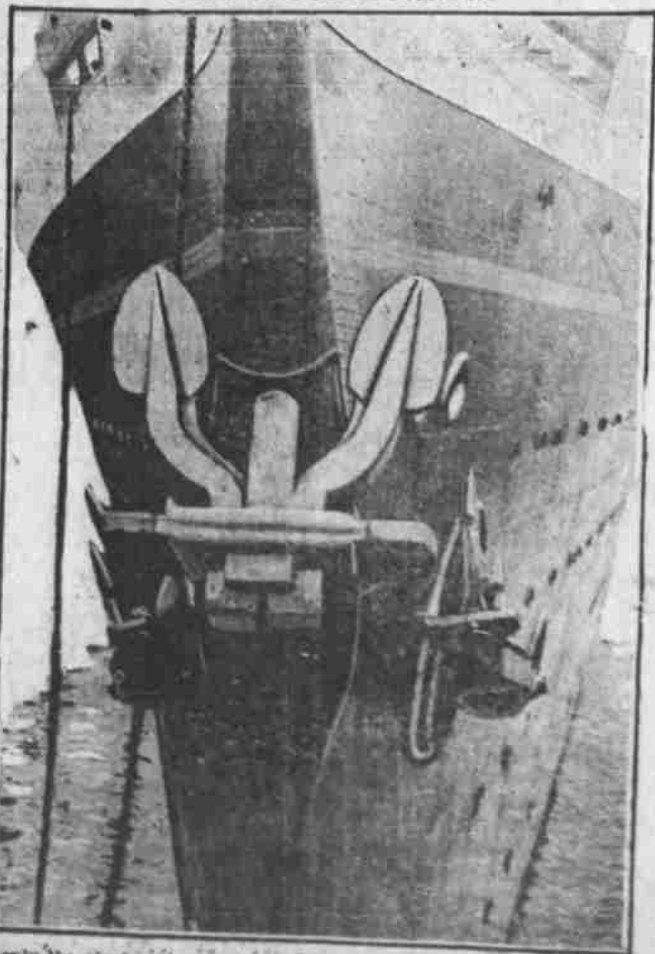

\$500 for the best technical plan for
street cleaning and the collection of
garbage and refuse in the city. In an-
nouncing the cash prize, Mayor Cur-
ry has in mind the technical problem

done better by contract labor or by
the city department forces.

students of Massachusetts Institute of

MENNONITES HAPPY IN MEXICAN HOMES

EL PASO, Texas, June 28.—"We
have found peace. We are happy."
This is the message coming out of
Mexico today from the Mennonite
pilgrims, who less than three months
ago left their lands in Manitoba,
Canada, to settle on a tract of 200,
000 acres in Chihuahua, Mexico.

On the vast tableland which this
religious sect purchased in order to
live and rear their families according
to their creed, a vast change has al-
ready taken place, according to John
F. D. Wiebe, who aided the Mennon-
ites in locating in their "promised
land."

The wilderness has given way to
works of civilization. Large areas
already are under cultivation. Upon
the plain has risen a quiet village,
with its stores and shops, its churches
and schools. Fat, cattle graze in the
new country, loving contentedly as
the shadows lengthen and the sound
of the church bells calls the sturdy,
plodding men of the fields to twilight
worship.

The first army of Mennonites of
the thousands who will leave Canada
for Mexico consisted of 1,800 persons
with their household effects, farm in-
struments and livestock. Reports com-
ing out of Mexico that this vanguard
had "fallen among thieves" is em-
phatically denied. There has been no
banditry nor outlawry, according to
Wiebe, who has recently returned
from visiting the colony.

The Mennonites are well liked by
the Mexicans and are contented with
their new homes. They have been
quick to adopt Mexican methods
where useful and many of the new
houses are being built of adobe in true
Mexican style.
