GOVERNOR FAVORS CHILD LABOR LAW

PROVINCE, R. I., June 30.—Federal protection must be restored to American children through amendment of the constitution and the passage by congress of another child labor law, declared Owen R. Lovejoy, general secretary of the National Child Labor Committee, addressing the seventeenth national conference on child labor here this afternoon.

Mr. Lovejoy announced this as the policy officially adopted by the national committee, saying that any further attempt to secure federal legislation without a constitutional amendment would be folly now that the U. S. supreme court has successfully found two federal child labor laws invalid on constitutional grounds.

Mr. Lovejoy said that the demand for an amendment comes from all over the country, including the south, where states' rights feeling is so strong. He quoted a telegram from Governor Thomas E. Kilby of Alabama favoring "an amendment empowering congress to enact laws for the regulation of child labor."

The amendment suggested by the national child labor committee, and read at the convention today by Mr. Lovejoy, is as follows: "Congress shall have power to regulate or forbid the labor of minors at an age, or under conditions deemed injurious to their health or morals. Such power shall be concurrent and not exclusive and the exercise thereof by congress shall not prevent any state from adopting other or further regulations, not inconsistent therewith."

Mr. Lovejoy said that this draft amendment protects the right of the states to go as far as they like, but enables congress to see a minimum standard of national decency. It is intended, before this amendment is introduced in congress, to submit it for approval to the permanent conference for the abolition of child labor formed in Washington recently by representatives of national civic organizations.

The national child labor committee, said Mr. Lovejoy, though it has entered into an active campaign for a federal amendment, will not diminish in any way its present efforts to improve state laws and administration.

REGINA, Saskatchewan.—Since the incorporation of the Live Stock Purchase and Sale Act by which the province of Saskatchewan sells pure-bred and grade livestock to the farmers of the province on credit, over 2,000 farmers have been assisted. Over 1,100 bulls, nearly 10,000 grade heifers and ewes, 400 rams and almost 16,000 grade ewes have been supplied to farmers on credit. Farmers in nearly every part of Saskatchewan have profited by this credit system, some in purchasing better stock and others in laying a foundation of a grade herd or flock.

Lived for 36 Years on Island With Lepers

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—(U. P.)—From the lonely solitude of the rock-bound leper settlement of Kalaheo, on the island of Molokai, Brother Joseph Dutton has sent to the "world outside" greetings on his 79th birthday.

Brother Dutton has been at the Kalaheo settlement for 36 years. He has never set foot of the lonely island since he first went there, when, fired by ideals of service to humanity, he began his ministrations to the leper boys and young men, himself always under the shadow of the living death.

Brother Dutton is the true successor to Father Damien, the martyr priest and first worker of the settlement, who was so deeply admired by Robert Louis Stevenson, and whose work Stevenson defended in the famous "Father Damien Letters."

Unlike Father Damien, who fell a victim to leprosy after years of devotion to nursing the unfortunates on Molokai, Brother Dutton has always maintained his good health. He is a civil war veteran, having retired after the close of hostilities with the rank of captain. He was at that time something of a Beau Brummell, dashing, gay, and loving the pleasures of life.

Suddenly, in his 35th year, it dawned on him that he was wasting his life. He determined to salvage it through religion. His religious fever aroused, he entered the Trappist monastery at Gethsemane, Kentucky, and determined to bury himself from the world and spend his days in self-abnegation.

While in the Redemptorist monastery in New Orleans, he chanced upon a magazine describing the work of Father Damien and his work among the lepers in the isolated Kalaheo colony on Molokai island.

Inspired by the work of the great priest who had dedicated his life to easing the pain of the hopeless outcasts, Brother Dutton determined to go to Molokai. He got in touch with Father Damien, who bade him come.

Early in the summer of 1886 he sailed from San Francisco, and on July 23 reached Kalaheo. From that day to this, he has never left the settlement.

"I expect to die on Molokai," Brother Dutton declared on his 79th birthday. "It is my home, and I am happy here—happy because I can live for others, and especially for those who need care and comfort and friendship as they wait for death in this lonely spot. I have had a full life, but I did not begin to live until I came to Kalaheo."

CLAIMS MAY BE FILED WITHIN FIVE YEARS

War veterans seeking government compensation because of disabilities due to war service may file claim with the United States Veterans' Bureau within five years after discharge from service, according to J. C. Joseph of Seattle, northwest district manager of the bureau. This definite word from the central office of the bureau dispels the interpretation of the law that certificates of injury had to be secured from the government before August 3 of this year in order to make claim for compensation after that date.

The instruction states that the claimant must prove that the disability due to war service arose within one year after discharge except in tubercular and mental cases, when two years is allowed. The suggestion that certificates of injury be secured by the veteran before August 3 was made for the benefit of the former service men. Such certificates would aid him in pushing a claim at a later date if it became necessary to do so. Because information has been broadcasted throughout the district to the effect that August 3 is the last day claims may be filed, without such certificates, the Veterans' bureau is eager to advise all former service people of the more liberal interpretation of the law which gives the veteran five years after discharge from service.
