Crop Is Light
 The state's hay crop will be short, in the opinion of F. L. Kent, of the Bureau of Crop Estimates, who is in Pendleton today. Mr. Kent is visiting various parts of the state and has noted that except for the irrigated sections, the crop is light. He is making arrangements to give his report in July.

Dismissed For Two Days
 There will be no sessions of the summer normal school on either Monday or Tuesday, July 3 and 4, according to an announcement made today by Supt. H. E. Inlow. On the following Saturday school will be held, however, to make up one of the two days.

The two days' vacation will permit students and members of the faculty three days in which to make trips or enjoy a respite from studies.

Mrs. Fitz Gerald and Arthur will return to Pendleton as soon as he recovers sufficiently to stand the trip.

Good Price Offered
 Following much discussion regarding whether or not foreign buyers will purchase wheat sold on the federal grades, Fred Bennion, county agent, is in receipt of a letter today from federal grain inspection headquarters saying that buyers will accept the grades. Furthermore, the letter states

that a better price will be paid for wheat sold under the federal grades than for wheat sold under the Portland Chamber of Commerce type sample.

 The Peoples Warehouse has brought suit against Earl Dudley to collect \$358.15 claimed to be due on a note. Fee and Fee represent the plaintiff.

 J. B. Spencer and L. M. Smith are the proprietors of a new poultry supply house which they have only recently opened at Hermiston. The men will handle all supplies needed by poultry growers.

Power To Be Off
 The Pacific Power & Light Co. announces that the power will be off on Sunday from 5 a. m. to 5 p. m. Lines in the east end are being transferred from a temporary location to a permanent one and it is therefore necessary to shut off the power while the work is being done.

 Licenses to wed have been issued to two couples at the office of County Clerk R. T. Brown during the past 24 hours. The applicants were Eugene Collins, salesman of Seattle, and Cora Naomi Kicker, a teacher of Milton; and Julius Donovan O'Dell, brakeman, and Minnie L. Hogan of Umatilla.

 H. F. Peters and his wife are at the camp all the way from Pendleton, where they own quite a bit of real estate. They are going down to Seaside for a few days and then back home to get ready for the Round-Up.—Oregonian.

Johnsons Bring Suits
 I. B. Johnson and Sons are plaintiffs in two suits which have been instituted in circuit court to collect on notes claimed to be past due and unpaid. G. H. Collins is defendant in one suit in which the plaintiffs seek to collect \$549, and G. A. Forth is defendant in the other. Peterson, Bishop and Clark represent the plaintiff in both cases.

Bid Is \$138,132
 The low bid made yesterday at Portland for the construction of the Old Oregon Trail highway from Dead Man's Pass to the Union county line was \$138,132, according to word received from Portland. This is considerably higher than former bids. It was referred to the county court for further consideration. The bid was made on condition of completion of the work in 1923.

Wage Scale Lower
 A copy of Sherman county's farm wage scale, received today by Fred Bennion, county agent, from W. S. Carpenter, county agent for Sherman county, shows that their scale is lower than that of this county. The scale is as follows: Grain haying, \$2; cook, roustabout, straw and wheat tender, \$3; sack sewers, \$3; truck drivers, \$4; combine drivers, \$4 to \$5; sack jigs, \$4, and separator tenders, \$5.

H. A. Scullen Here
 H. A. Scullen, beekeeping specialist from Oregon Agricultural College, is in the county for a conference with beekeepers. Last night he met with the amateur beekeepers of Pendleton at the home of Ed Mable, in Riverside. Every-day problems of the beekeeper were discussed. Today he is visiting Stanfield and Hermiston apiaries. On July 2 a meeting is to be held at the J. Skovbo apiaries at Diversion Dam, between Hermiston and Umatilla. Mr. Scullen will then visit Butte creek and larger apiaries.

Construction Work Finished
 Construction work in Pendleton on the Northern Pacific which has been under way for several weeks will be completed this evening, it was stated today by officials of the road. The work consists of new timbers above the ties and heavy rails. With the completion of this work, heavy rails are now in use in full length of the branch line from Pasco to Pendleton. A bridge crew which has been making repairs on a bridge near here has not yet completed its work and will be on the job for a few more days.

To Meet At Milton
 C. K. Warner, scoutmaster for boy scouts in the western division of the United States, will be one of the chief speakers of a meeting of the county council of the American Legion which will be held tonight at Milton. 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CANADIAN PRISONER TO RECEIVE FORTY LASHES

DETROIT, June 30.—The ancient law of the whip has been imposed on Ernest Martin, who was sentenced at Sandwich, Ont., just across the border in Canada, to ten years in the penitentiary. Judge Coughlin decreed that in addition to his prison term Martin receive twenty lashes upon his arrival at the prison and twenty when he leaves. The punishment will be inflicted on the bare back, the instrument being a stout ash stick to which is appended twelve heavy leather thongs.

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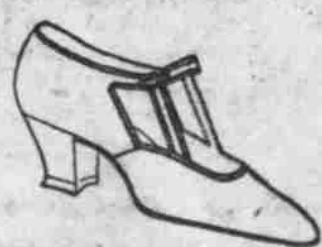
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
