How to Save Food in Hot Weather

- Keep the ice chamber of your refrigerator well filled. The ice melts more slowly.
- Have the refrigerator large enough. Do not crowd it full of food. It is not the size of the box so much as it is the quantity of food which consumes ice.
- Keep the refrigerator in a cool spot, away from draft.
- Close the doors tightly, to prevent warm air from seeping in. Open the doors as little as possible.
- Don't put any food on the ice or in the ice chamber; leave the ice uncovered.
- Never put hot food in the refrigerator. Let it cool a bit first.

HERMISTON, Ore., July 1.—Hermiston has forfeited her last game to Echo and Stanfield has forfeited her last game to Umatilla. This leaves Echo and Umatilla tied for the championship of the Irrigation league and the tie will be played off in a post season game to be played at Hermiston Sunday.

The two leading teams have each won nine and lost three of this year's contests. A few weeks ago it looked like a sure victory for Umatilla, but Echo has strengthened her lineup and now has a first class squad in every respect.

Both organizations are keen to win the game here and interest is high in all the west end towns. Indications are that the biggest crowd that ever saw a ball game in the west end will be out Sunday.
