cording to announcement made last night at the meeting of the city council by Councilman William Dunn, chairman of the parks committee. He succeeds Jack Miller who has accepted work with Hamley & Co.

Alarm Was False.

Firemen thought for an instant last night that they had a real fire on their hands when they came in sight of the Collins warehouse on East Webb street. A smoke stack just east of the warehouse was belching smoke at a rapid rate, and a resident, seeing this, gave the alarm. From the west side it seemed that the warehouse must be rapidly burning. The alarm was turned in shortly after 8 o'clock.

Park Beats Natatorium.

The city camp grounds park is winner for the month of June over the city natatorium in revenue according to figures submitted to the city council last night by City Recorder Thomas Fitz Gerald. During the month the natatorium receipts were \$181, and during the same time the receipts at the camp grounds were \$196.50. One factor that entered into the difference, however, is the fact that only a part

of the month was sufficiently warm to stimulate swimming, and June is usually a month of heavy tourist traffic.

Hermiston shipped 100 bags of potatoes yesterday to Spokane, Walla Walla, Baker, La Grande and Pendleton dealers. The potatoes are known as the "Earliest of All" and all have been graded. The greater part of the potatoes graded No. 1.

Crops Are Estimated.

Stanfield will grow twice the apples it grew last year. Hermiston will have about the same crop as in 1922 but the crop in the east end will be light this year, thinks Fred Bennion, county agent. He predicts a light prune crop in this county.

W. L. Thompson and son, Edward Thompson, arrived here this morning from Portland by motor. Mr. Thompson will be here for a two days' business visit, but his son will remain for the rest of the summer and will be employed in the H. W. Collins grain office.

Adams Welcomes Tourists.

B. H. Inman, city marshal of Adams, was a visitor in Pendleton today. He reports that Adams now has a tourist park where visitors are always welcome. They make no charges and wood is furnished for fuel. Ben also admits that the moral atmosphere of Adams has been greatly purified and rarified since he became city marshal.

Indians Are Arrested.

Ross Emmett and Jennie Van Pelt, both Indians, were arrested by members of the sheriff's force last night on statutory charges. They waived examination this morning before Justice Joe H. Parker and were bound over to await the action of the grand jury. The woman was permitted her freedom on her own recognizance, and Emmett's bond was fixed at \$200.

Boy Scouts To Meet.

Boy Scouts of Troop 1, who were to have met tonight, have postponed the meeting until tomorrow night, when a joint meeting will be held with the boys of Troop 2. Mrs. Bentley Sues.

Claiming that her aged husband, John M. Bentley threatened on several occasions to strike her with his walking stick, Evelyn L. Bentley has brought suit for divorce from him in circuit court. She charges cruel and inhuman treatment. In the complaint it is set forth that she married him in March, 1922, when she was 48 years old, and that her husband was then 51. She sets forth that he promised her they would travel widely if she would marry him. She asks now for \$2,500 alimony in gross, costs of this case, \$100 a month permanent alimony. In addition to this, she asks the court to grant her one-third of the property. She states in her complaint that she is without funds or property, aside from her clothing and personal effects. She wants to assume her former name, Evelyn Veness. Her attorneys are Peterson, Bishop and Clark.

100 INJURED IN NEW YORK SUBWAY FIRE

NEW YORK, July 6.—(U. P.)—Little children were trampled while men and women fought terrified in the darkness thirty-five feet under

ground today when a short circuit in the Jerome Avenue express train set the train afire, and black smoke billowed through the cars. Windows were broken as passengers battled. Children and women passed to safety through broken window panes. Their clothing was torn and faces cut with glass and finger nails in struggles in the darkness. The train crew extinguished the flames with extinguishers, while firemen and police descended into the subway depths to quell the panic and prevent loss of life. The hospitals were quickly filled with the injured and those overcome by smoke and fright. A police check showed none killed and about a hundred injured.

LOST LAKE ROAD OPENS ON FRIDAY

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 6.—The Lost Lake highway will be opened to the public all the way to the lake next Friday, according to W. A. Langille, in charge of improvements on the route.
