## Rev. Huling Accepts.

Rev. J. Franklin Huling, who has been acting as pastor of the Baptist church for the past two months, has accepted the pastorate for the coming year. He and Mrs. Huling will both be active in the work of the church. Rev. Huling came west to Los Angeles in 1908 and began his work as pastor in Southern California churches. During the war, he served as chaplain in the army at Camp Taylor, Ky., and at Camp Lewis, Wash. In addition to being a graduate of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., and of the Los Angeles Bible Institute, he holds a degree of Master of Arts from the University of Southern California. Before coming to Pendleton, Rev. Huling was pastor of Hoover Street Baptist church in Los Angeles. Mrs. Huling was for several years a resident of Portland. In 1912, she was graduated from the Bible Institute of Los Angeles, and was asked by the dead, Dr. R. A. Torrey, to be superintendent of women students. She filled this position until 1921 when she resigned to become the wife of Rev. Huling. While she was at the Bible Institute, she had from 250 to 275 young women under her care.

"I spent the winter at the home of Joseph Bady, shoemaker, in the Island of Martinique, who begs me to salute in his name my Alaskan host."



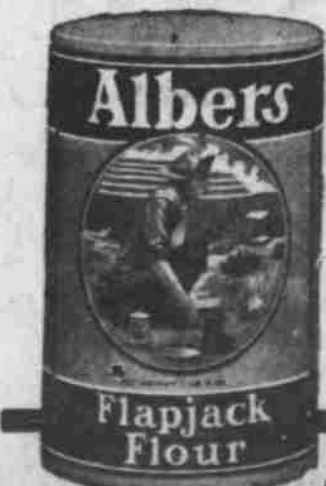

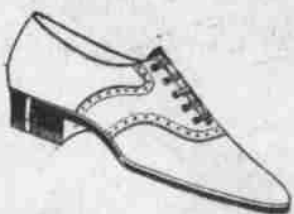
