## VETERANS FROM OVER WORLD TO VISIT SEATTLE

SEATTLE, July 10.—Veterans of Foreign Wars in Pittsburgh, Pa., home of commander-in-chief Robert G. Woodside have arranged for a twelve-car special to bring the Smoky City delegates and visitors to the 23rd annual encampment of the organization in Seattle August 15 to 19. The special train is scheduled to arrive here August 13, according to word received at convention headquarters. The Commander-in-Chief and his staff will be quartered at the Hotel Butler, which has been designated as encampment headquarters. The encampment in Seattle will bring delegates and visitors from all parts of the world. Paris, France, will send a delegation from the Benjamin Franklin Post of the V. F. W. There, according to cabled information to Commander Woodside and relayed to encampment headquarters here, Franklin Post is composed chiefly of members of the Graves Registration Service, American journalists who were with the A. E. F. during the war and American veterans residing in Paris. From the Philippine Islands and China will come two delegates from V. F. W. posts located at Manila and Peking. Honolulu and Guam will each send a delegate to represent posts in the Pacific Islands possessions and delegates will come from Panama, Porto Rico and Cuba.

**MUMMY DECLARED SAINT**

## BEARS WILL START GRID PRACTICE EARLY

SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—(U. P.)—Football practice will start unofficially at the Berkeley campus about the middle of August.

Coach Andy Smith will put all likely candidates through the paces, and will give a thorough course of instruction in the elements of his football system to all comers.

Although the university opens for the fall session about the middle of August, the coast football season does not get under way until about September 15. Regular varsity practice will not begin until about that time.

Assistant Coaches Rosenthal and Price will pay special attention to many likely Bruin material developed in the numerous class first and second teams, which will hold sway early in the season in full force.

California has a stiff season on its hands this year. The Golden Bears will meet the University of Southern California at Los Angeles, and hope to beat the booster boys as badly on their home lot as they did this year in Berkeley. California will also make a trip north to play Washington, which is expected to be a stiff game.

The climax of the season, of course, is the big game with Stanford, which will be played at the Palo Alto bowl against this year.

Stanford is believed to have an excellent chance of barbecuing a bear when the big day rolls around. Pop Warner's two assistants, Thornhill and Kerr, will be on the job early at the Palo Alto institution. Informal practice is expected to get under way ten days before college officially opens about the first of September. They are thoroughly familiar with the Warner system and are expected to produce a team that can show Andy's lads a good many tricks they never dreamed of before. The Cardinal fans were greatly cheered by the news that Art Wilcox will return to college this fall. It had been reported that he would not come back. On paper, the Stanford prospective eleven stacks up about 50-50 with California. Stanford should have the best of the line, and California the advantage of a brilliant veteran backfield. California will open the season on September 30, with a game with Santa Clara.

## Making Hot Fight to Beat Senator Reed

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 10.—(United Press).—With the Missouri primary election yet nearly a month distant, state-wide interest in the United States senatorial contests—especially the "boiling over" point.

Breckenridge Long, former third assistant secretary of state during Wilson's administration, and Robert L. Young, of St. Joseph, are seeking the mantle of Senator James A. Reed.

It is an out-and-out fight between Reed and Long and their battle lines are clearly drawn. At the outset of the campaign, former President Woodrow Wilson wrote a series of letters to St. Louis newspapers and politicians charging Reed in substance with deserting the democratic standard. In one communication, he termed the silver-tongued Missourian a "marplot."

The Wilson letters are interesting throughout the state as Wilson's passive, at least, support of Long against Reed, although the former's name was never directly mentioned.

Reed has replied in his characteristically smashing, aggressive manner. Taking the stump the first week in May, the senator at once leaped to the aggressive, defending his own political record and challenging that of Long's.

The republican situation is more complicated. Seven candidates filed to have their names placed on the ballot for submission to the voters at the primary August 1. They are R. B. Brewster, Kansas City lawyer; State Senator, David Proctor, Kansas City; Attorney General Jesse W. Barrett; John C. McKinley, former lieutenant governor; William Sacks, St. Louis millionaire banker; Colonel John H. Parker, commander of the seventh army corps area, and Sterling P. Bond, St. Louis.

The nomination today apparently lies between the first four named. None can strictly be termed the "old guard" candidate. Brewster who took the stump for Roosevelt enjoys the support of every Kansas City newspaper, that of Governor Arthur M. Hyde, and presumably the state organization. He also has the backing of the Kansas City "house-cleaning" element and is favored by many St. Louis republican leaders.

Proctor, who has waged a vigorous campaign, declares he will carry 75 per cent of the counties of the state. But the democratic senatorial contest apparently far overshadows interest in the republican fight. So strenuous has been Reed's stamping tour that early in June, his backers feared he might suffer a physical breakdown when he was forced to quit speaking one night in the middle of an address. He rallied overnight, however, and has since taken up the fight more vigorously than before.

The democratic state committee has issued a formal statement declaring it does not support the candidacy of any individual in the primary. Reed's strength will come mainly from the larger cities, his friends admit. Impartial observers declare that in a score of counties Long has a lead of from two to five to one. Reed will spend the closing days of the campaign in the small rural communities, while Long will stump in the cities. Whether Reed can overcome this situation by a big vote in St. Louis and Kansas City, or by making gains through personal appeals between now and August 1 is one of the big questions of the campaign.

## ANTI-ROOSTER ORDINANCE ASKED BY CO-EDS

BERKELEY, Cal., July 10.—(U. P.)—California co-eds may go to bed with the chickens, although there is no case on record, but they don't want to get up with them.

Hence the co-eds have gotten together, and are asking an anti-rooster ordinance for the city of Berkeley. They have no objection to hens, but to introduce strutting males into the chicken pens of Berkeley's intellectual back yards is too much, say the co-eds.

The first move against the chanticleers was made by Miss Gertrude Charny, a junior student, who appeared before the city council and asked the anti-rooster ordinance.

"Roosters are entirely out of place in a university community," Miss Charny declared. "Thinking people cannot have good health and live around roosters. Hens are all right, but roosters are too much."

Miss Charny thereupon presented a legally phrased petition to the councilmen asking them to act on the matter.

"We the undersigned ask an ordinance be passed prohibiting the keeping of roosters in Berkeley. Chicken raising will not make Berkeley a great city nor increase property values. But it is injuring the health of many who are prevented from sleeping by the incessant crowing of roosters at night, and it tends to drive some desirable settlers away. Rooster nuisance is wholly out of place in a residential and university city like Berkeley."

The council scratched its collective head, and wondered what it could do about the matter.

Commissioner Schmidt opined that the council lacked jurisdiction. "This, it seems to me," he said, is a problem for sex control specialists. They tell me some of these fellows can look at an egg and tell whether it's going to be a hen or a rooster. May be we could pass an ordinance inducing merchants to quit selling rooster eggs."

Miss Charny declared that she had stayed up several nights making a study of the question, and could assure the council that Berkeley roosters usually began crowing as early as 1:30 a. m., and continued crowing thereafter until after daylight.

The matter was finally put up to the city attorney. He was asked to give a legal opinion on the jurisdiction of the council to prevent roosters from annoying co-eds in the university town.
