Wheat—There was general strength shown from the start and although the market at one time lost nearly all of its advance the close was at the best prices for the day, the setback like yesterday was based on the idea that an early settlement will be made in the railroad strike. In fact the new indications are much to the contrary, other developments of the day were of a sort conducive to an advancing market. Liverpool was higher, cash prices in practically all markets gained on the futures, responding to an urgent demand from domestic mills. Crop reports in the northwest were less encouraging than they have been of late and perhaps more important than all else, there is evidence of a revived interest in important exporters. It was said after the close that sales of about 500,000 bushels had been made out of Chicago alone and it was generally believed that the total business in all positions will be of a larger proportion if this buying by foreigners today should prove the beginning of the long awaited buying, prices would undoubtedly develop a definite upward movement.

BOOTH AND BARRATT SAY REPORT IS UNTRUE

GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 12.—Denial was made here today by R. A. Booth and W. B. Barratt that they are about to resign from the state highway commission. The commissioners arrived here this morning from the Oregon caves and immediately they were notified by long distance telephone of the published rumor of their impending resignation. The commissioners could not understand how such a report gained circulation, nor upon what it was based. This is the first time in five days that they have been in communication with the world as they have been touring remote sections of the Oregon coast where there are no telegraph wires and mails require days to be delivered.

It has been common talk for a year that Mr. Booth planned resigning and he prepared his resignation shortly before the holidays, when he was operated on in Portland. Messrs. Yeon and Barratt dissuaded him from quitting. Mr. Barratt, appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late E. E. Kiddle, is now holding appointment for the full term. On accepting this full term he informed the governor that he might move to Portland in a year or two, which would necessitate his resignation from the commission as the eastern Oregon member.

There is not the slightest intention of any of the three members to surrender their positions on the commission until at least they have brought the road programme to such an advanced stage that the main work will have been performed and the policy firmly established, it was asserted.

There is the greatest harmony among the three commissioners and with the governor's office. Pressure of private business has been urging Mr. Booth to resign, but at the earnest solicitation of his colleagues he has remained at his post. Unless something unforeseen occurs there is little likelihood of any of the commissioners resigning before the 1922 programme is mapped out. Both Messrs. Booth and Barratt said emphatically today that resignation is the thing furthest from their thoughts.

Rights of way are being obtained for the widening of the McKenzie highway at O'Brien's Point, at Deersborn, and at other places where it is to be improved.

- Selection of Household Materials
- Linen should be pure, for then only does it have the properties for which we buy it.
- That is, luster, resistance to soil, and being easily kept white and clean. For instance, when cotton is used for towels it very quickly gets gray. Cotton sheets and pillow cases are most generally used and many housekeepers are finding mercerized table cloths satisfactory.
- Good table linen is soft and yielding in the hand, yet elastic and tough like leather. It is not stiff and crackly. If one has some knowledge of linens, it is well to buy at that time of year when the price is reduced. Linen should always be bought at a reliable house and of a salesman who knows quality. Extremely fine thread in canvas is not desirable; strong round thread is best.
