## HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES

- Reports Given
- The following reports have come in on labor saving appliances:
- Bread-mixing—Saves 20 minutes each baking and the bread has better texture.
- Dish drainer—Saves time in drying dishes. A family of four saves 1-2 hour per day and one clear that it is more sanitary.
- Steam cooker and canner—Several women are using it daily and say they couldn't keep house without it.
- Pressure cooker—Excellent for quick work where gas or oil is used. Not economical for use with wood.
- Home made tray wagon—Most useful thing in the house.
- One woman reports that she even serves luncheons from it on these very hot days. (Drawing plan may be had upon request to home demonstration agent.)
- Fireless cooker—Both commercial and home made ones in use to save heating kitchen stove in middle of day.—V. D.

## To Make Ebony From The Pine

(United Press Staff Correspondent)

BERLIN, July 18.—(U. P.)—Conversion of pine, poplar and other ordinary woods into hard wood, comparable in all respects to ebony, mahogany and the like, is possible under a new German invention.

Rights to this invention have been obtained by Albert Theodore Otto, New York business man, who represents in America the great Krupp concern.

Otto believes the invention will have a marked effect upon the hardwood industry of the world, causing a vast drop in the importation of mahogany, ebony and such woods.

The device consists in a hydraulic apparatus, which compresses ordinary soft woods to the point where they are so heavy that they will sink in water. Any desired color of wood can be obtained by putting a stain through the wood. They under force before the actual compression of the wood is accomplished. Then the whole structure has the same color. Ebony is obtained with black stain; mahogany with the rich dark brown stain.

It is absolutely impossible to distinguish the fabricated hardwood from the natural, for it has all of the characteristics of weight, wear and beauty, according to German experts.
