Quotations Nominal On Portland Market

(From The Oregon Journal.)

A single load of livestock was all the new supply that North Portland reported for the Tuesday trade. There was practically no change in the general situation, and quotations were on a nominal basis.

In the hog alleys nothing has been sold recently above \$11.75, and while the former \$12 top is not quoted, still this has really been a quarter above the market for several days. The one slight change in the situation is the weakness of feeder pigs, the top now being no higher than \$12.

Liberties Dominating Factor On Market

NEW YORK, July 21.—(A. P.)—United States war loans again dominated the bond market yesterday, new high records being established by Liberty first 4 1-4s at 101.25, third 4 1-2s at 100.70 and fourth 4 1-4s at 101.24.

These gains were the more striking because of the irregularity and occasional heaviness manifested by several of the foreign issues. Mexican government 5s fell 1 1-2 points and Cuban republic 5s lost 1 point with narrow changes, mostly lower. In the European division, the one noteworthy exception was city of Berne 8s, which gained 1 1-2 points.

Among rails, especial strength was displayed by New York Central debenture 6s, St. Louis & San Francisco adjustment 6s, Chesapeake & Ohio convertible 4 1-2s, St. Paul convertible 4 1-2s, Southern railway 5s, and Missouri, Kansas & Texas first 4s.

Chile Copper 6s, Goodrich 5 1-2s, Midvale Steel 5s and United States Steel 5s were firm to strong with Armour 4 1-2s, Wilson convertible 6s and several of the local tractions, including Third Avenue adjustments and laterborough Rapid Transit refunding 5s. Total bond sales, par value, aggregated \$14,182,000.

The stock market was firm to strong during the first half of today's active session, but developed irregular tendencies later on renewed selling of prominent specialties, including tin motors.

Traders for the long account showed greater caution as a result of the less favorable aspects of the coal and railroad strikes, although shares of those descriptions were well supported.

Offerings of automobile issues were attended by rumors dealing with the financial status of several of the prominent companies, but general conditions in the motor trade were declared to be favorable.

Washington advices intimating that the federal trade commission is likely to announce formal approval of the Republic-Midvale-Inland merger stimulated further buying of secondary steels and United States Steel established a new quotation for the current movement.

Changes among equipments, coppers, textiles, rubbers and chemicals ranged from one to two points at best, but these were much impaired or entirely canceled in the liquidation of the final hour, when Pierce-Arrow preferred and Studebaker led to the reaction.

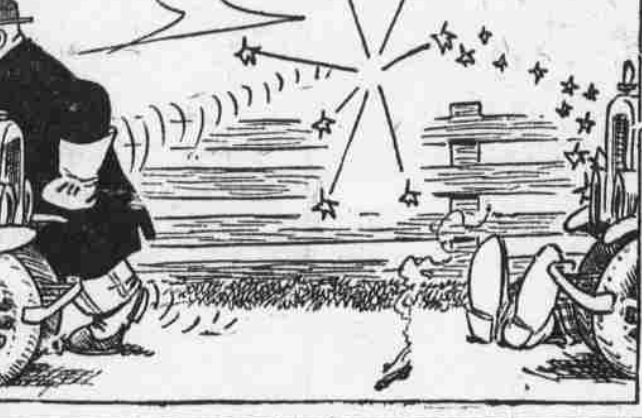
From its extreme rise of 6 points to a level 21 points above the recent low, Mexican Petroleum fell back sharply, making a net gain of 1 1-2 points. Republic Iron was the only steel of its particular type to retain much of its advance in the reversal, rails also yielding. Sales amounted to 725,000 shares.

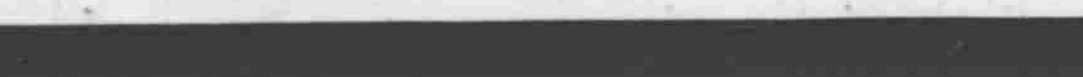
