ANTI-COMPENSATION ARGUMENTS NOT TRUE LEGION MEMBER SAYS

WASHINGTON, July 25.—John Thomas Taylor, vice chairman, national legislative committee of the American Legion, today, answered attacks on adjusted compensation as follows: "In its latest attack upon adjusted compensation for world war veterans, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States quotes statistics to show that non-service workers received wage increases during the war period of from 17 to 50 per cent., and uses these figures in an effort to minimize the financial handicap suffered by the soldier because of his service. The chamber admits, however, that in ship building yards, and a very few special trades, there were 'unusual' total monthly wages paid. "The chamber's argument upon this question is unique, for it fails to comprehend that the financial handicap suffered by the soldier was not the difference between the war wage and the pre-war wage, but actually was the difference between the war wage quoted by the Chamber and the 129 a month received by the soldier while he was in uniform. "As another argument against adjusted compensation, the chamber states that Secretary Mellon estimates a deficit approaching \$200,000,000 for the next fiscal year. This same old

cry of 'wolf' has been emanating from the treasurer perennially. The chamber seems to have forgotten that only last December the treasury estimated the deficit would be \$25,000,000, and that when the books were closed on July 1, instead of the predicted deficit, there was a surplus of \$212,000,000. "The spectre of 'frozen credits' is also revived by the Chamber, as an argument against the banks lending a few millions to needy soldiers on their proposed adjusted service certificates. With Wall street lending billions for new financing and 'permanent' easy money in sight, 'the frozen credits' fallacy has been exploded. Billions are going to foreign countries. "The adjusted compensation bill which passed the lower house by a vote of 322 to 70, will shortly become a law. Sixty-seven of the 86 senators have stated in writing that they will vote favorably upon it."

CENTURARY TREE GIVEN TREATMENT BY DOCTOR

ATLANTA, Ga., July 25.—After weathering several centuries what is declared to be the oldest and largest sassafras tree in existence is receiving first aid from a tree surgeon. The tree, which measures about nine feet in circumference, stands on the lawn of the First Methodist church here.

RUN AUTO ON AIR

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 25.—(U. P.)—A compressed air automobile engine that will revolutionize the motor car industry is the invention claimed by Christian Ed-

wards, formerly of Detroit, who came here for his health. Edwards claims his engine will develop 1,600 horsepower on air. The motor requires neither gas, oil, electricity, or water to operate, he says, and is practically silent running. Compressed air is used in the motor. The same air is used over and over, according to Edwards.

CATHERINE TINGLEY OPENS CAMPAIGN TO MAKE EUROPE HAPPY

PARIS, July 25.—Catherine Tingley, seventy-year-old theosophist from Point Loma, Cal., has arrived here, with a staff of her students, "to give back to Europe the joy of life."

"We shall conduct a campaign against the misery, sickness and seemingly hopeless pessimism of the European nations," declared Madam Tingley. "It is meant to give them back their joy of life and teach them that nothing but the firm belief in the godly origin of man will at last make them give up the idea of wars, political power and imperialism."

"It seems to me that the European nations can't be helped unless they completely forget all about hatred and wars. But obviously it is hard for them to learn that their former idols were vain altogether. It is only through the children that things can be improved and especially by new methods of education. I brought up hundreds of them of all nationalities in Point Loma, and none of them knows anything about nationalism, chauvinism, or enmity between the nations. Don't you think that that would also be possible in Europe?"

"I understand that there is still a good deal of animosity against Americans in this country on account of Wilson's failure at Versailles. As far as I am concerned, I was received here with open arms and the utmost kindness, but certainly I cannot blame the Germans for not liking our former president after the experience they had had with him."

"It is absolutely imperative that the Versailles treaty should be revised. For years and years I tried to convince the American people by public lectures in all parts of the states that they, to a considerable extent, are also responsible for this treaty and must do something to abolish it. I intend to do the same thing here."

"America and Germany are two countries which have a good deal to give to and to learn from each other. German literature and, above all, German music, was very much liked over there before the war."

"I am sure that America will let the German people have something of her abundance of raw materials and economic sources of all kinds and also that she will some time feel obliged to give back something to Germany which she needs most—the joy of life, which is the one thing man can never miss be he wherever he is."

"It strikes me that people in America are young and optimistic, whereas people in this country are old and pessimistic. It's my heart's desire to change this and to show them that the real way to happiness lies in the blessings of theosophy."

TESTS SHOW VEAL IS GOOD PROPERLY COOKED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—Veal, contrary to the common belief, is wholesome and easily digested, experiments carried on by the United States department of agriculture have shown. Much of the prejudice against veal is a result of improper methods in preparation. It is a palatable meat, resembling the white meat of chicken in flavor. If eaten when served rare or even underdone, veal is unappetizing and may cause some discomfort. The results are also unsatisfactory if veal is overcooked either by vigorous boiling or by roasting at a high temperature. Because of the rather mild flavor veal dishes are improved by seasoning with certain vegetables and herbs, such as carrots, onions, green peppers, celery, parsley, or thyme.

The office of home economics of the United States department of agriculture has drawn up a suggestive list of cuts suitable for various dishes.

This list is not at all arbitrary and need not be slavishly followed. Cuts from the fore quarter of veal and a few of the tougher cuts from the hind quarter may require long cooking by such methods as stewing and braising, while the loin, the leg, and the rib

Cuts are desirable for roasts and entrees.

The cuts best suited to soup making are the flank, the hind shank, the knuckle of the fore shank, or the rib ends. A well-seasoned veal soup, if strained and chilled makes a very appetizing jelly for serving occasionally in place of the usual hot soup.

For stews it is well to buy the neck, the ends of the ribs, the breast, or the thick part of the fore shank. Some of these cuts contain considerable soft bone, or cartilage, which may be removed from the stew before serving. Stews should be simmered slowly, avoiding an excess of water. The flavor of a stew is much improved if the pieces of meat are browned lightly in a little fat before adding the water.

Braising is a combination of stewing and roasting. The surface of the meat is usually seared in hot fat, then placed in a casserole or other baking dish with a cover, seasonings, including vegetables, if liked and a little water are added and the whole cooked slowly in the oven. Such cuts as the shoulder, the breast, the fore-shank, the flank (rolled), and even the neck are suited to this method.

Veal steak is cut from the round. The cuts corresponding to porter house steak in beef are merely large chops when cut from the smaller veal carcass. Steaks and chops may be either broiled or sautéed. Cutlets are usually taken from the round, although when breaded and fried the cheaper shoulder cuts are quite satisfactory.

Roasts are frequently cut from the leg, from the loin and from the rack or rib. The shoulder may be boned for a roast. The breast, boned and rolled, is excellent for this purpose.
