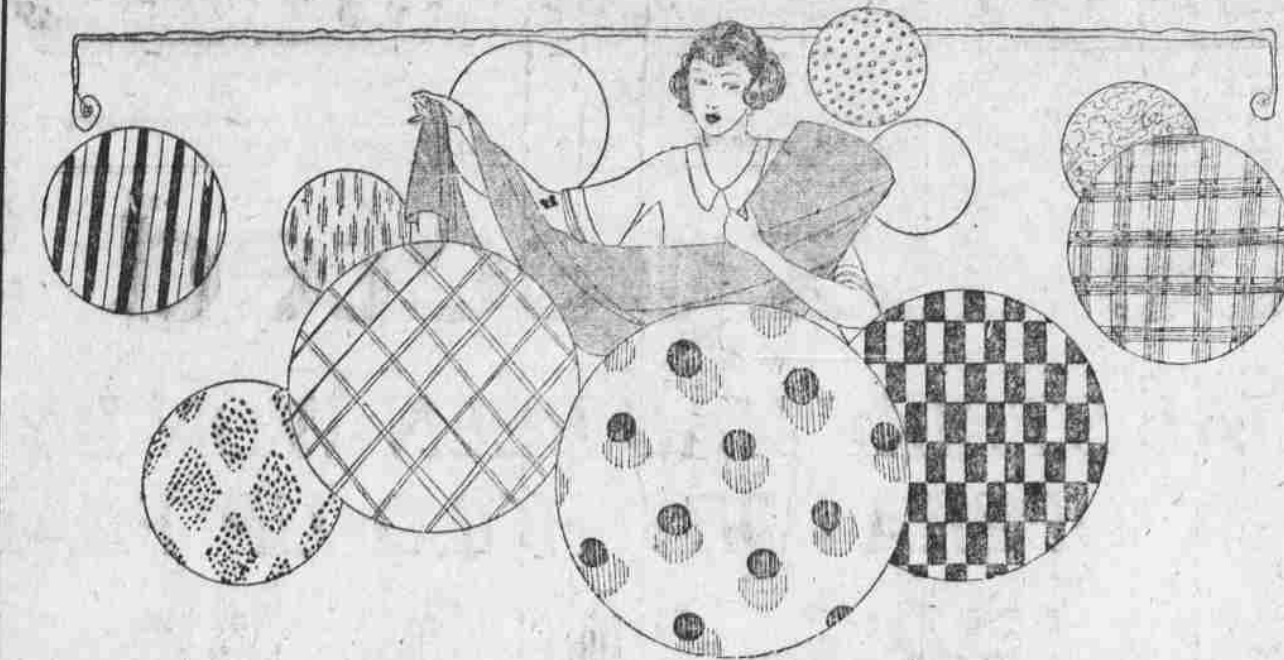

DYNAMITE IS USED TO DESTROY MONSTER STILL

GREENVILLE, S. C., July 28.—What is declared to be the largest and most complete distilling plant ever seized by raiding officers was captured near here by a group of Federal prohibition officers.

The outfit was too large to be destroyed with axes, and two sticks of dynamite were set off under the apparatus, blowing it to bits.

The plant consisted of a large brick furnace base, over which was a steel riveted boiler having a capacity of approximately 400 gallons. Two copper condensing outfits were connected with the boiler, each having a capacity of ninety gallons. Five thousand gallons of rye beer was poured out by the officers. No arrests were made.

STATUE IS STOLEN FROM MUSEUM AT VERSAILLES

Attendees at the Versailles Palace, hastily summoned, could not explain the mystery. It is believed that the statuette was stolen during the noon hour, but attendants assert the room had not been left unwatched. The statuette was wrenched from its pedestal.

Old guides at the palace say the little art-work was placed in the room it occupied—Louis XIV's sleeping apartment—by King Louis Philippe about 1835 and has never been disturbed since.

'YOUNG BLOOD' COMING TO THE NEXT CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(U. P.)—Congress is due for an infusion of "young blood," as this year's campaign finds many of the veterans of the legislative halls retiring to their homes either from choice or because of the popular will.

Not only will younger men, in many cases, occupy the seats now held by stalwarts of another day, but men of a younger political era, indications are, will be more numerous in the next congress than in many years.

The "young bloods," it now appears likely, will be largely in two groups—the so-called progressives, and the service men, veterans of the world war.

The progressives bid fair to infuse new life into the progressive block in the senate by increasing its numbers, while in the house already considerable representation of war veterans probably will be substantially increased.

"Uncle Joe" Cannon, patriarch of Capitol Hill, who will retire, rounds out 46 years service in the house next March. Fordney of Michigan, joint author with Senator McCumber, of

the Fordney-McCumber tariff, now under discussion in the senate, is retiring after 24 years' continuous service. Rodenberg, Illinois, after 20 years, has declined to run again. Mondell, Wyoming, is a candidate for senate, after 26 years in the house.

In the senate, McCumber, North Dakota, fourth oldest in length of service in the Upper Chamber, leaves after 24 years, being defeated for the republican nomination by former Governor Lynn J. Frazier, Culberson, Texas, a candidate for re-election, Warren, Wyoming; Nelson, Minnesota, and Lodge, Massachusetts, are the only ones who were in the senate when McCumber was first elected. McCumber is 64.

Page, of Vermont, probably will not be a candidate again, after serving since 1908. Williams, Mississippi, 63, elected in 1911, refuses to be a candidate for re-election.

Passing of the captains who for so long have kept the capitol ship on an even keel, at once opens up the perplexing question of seniority rule in appointing committee chairmen.

Heretofore, with few exceptions, it has been the unwritten law that point of service shall determine chairmanships. The most notable deviation was the appointment of Rep. Madden, Ill., to the chairmanship of the appropriations committee.

The seniority question in the senate is particularly annoying to party leaders. With McCumber out, Smoot, Utah, ordinarily would succeed to the head of the finance committee. But Smoot is on the appropriations committee, and cannot hold both posts. If he should decide to remain with appropriations, La Follette, Wisconsin, whom conservatives have tried to "read out" of the republican party, would, under seniority rule, succeed to the finance chairmanship. That is not all the aim of the old guard, who are opposed to liberals in important senate posts.

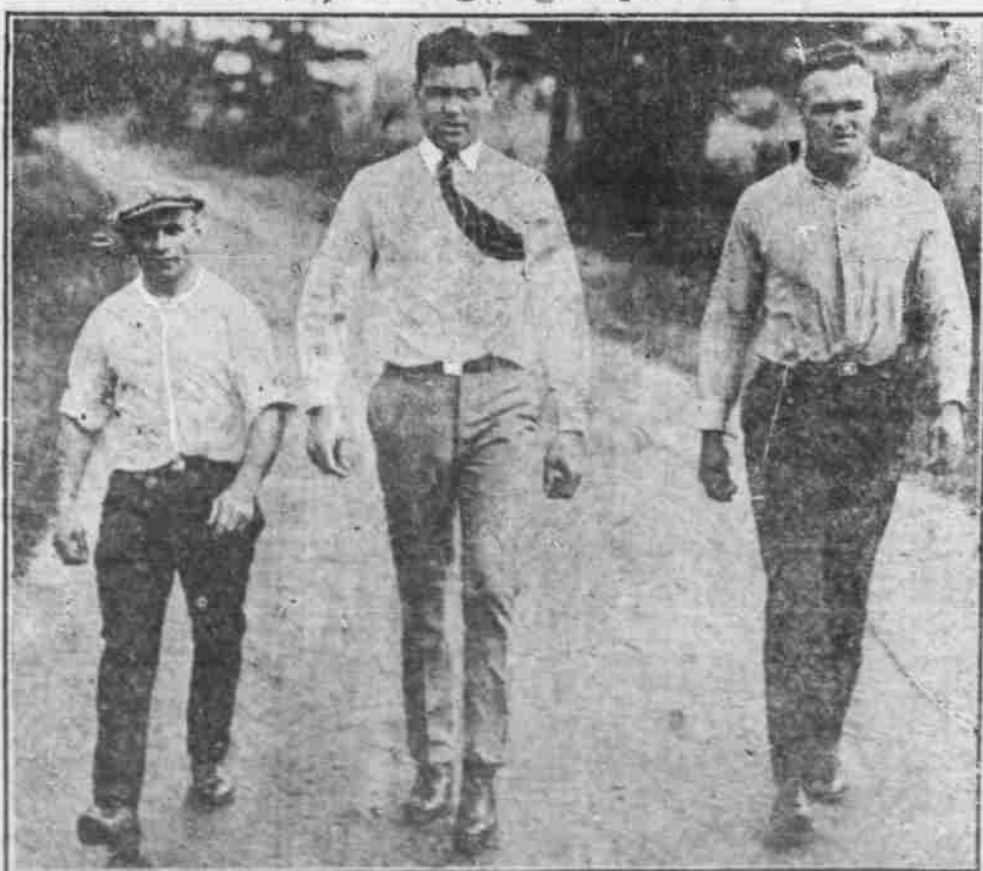
A similar situation develops in the foreign relations committee. Should Lodge be defeated for re-election, Borah, Idaho, whose ideas on world relationships are not in accord with old guard policies, approaches the chairmanship. McCumber at present is the ranking republican.

Briefly, the situation which confronts standpatters summers down to this:

While seniority rule as a usual thing is satisfactory, certain instances arise when the committee must be brave to deviate from the long-established unwritten law.

This appears to be the year—with two republican "insurgents" in line for two of the most important committee posts in the senate.
