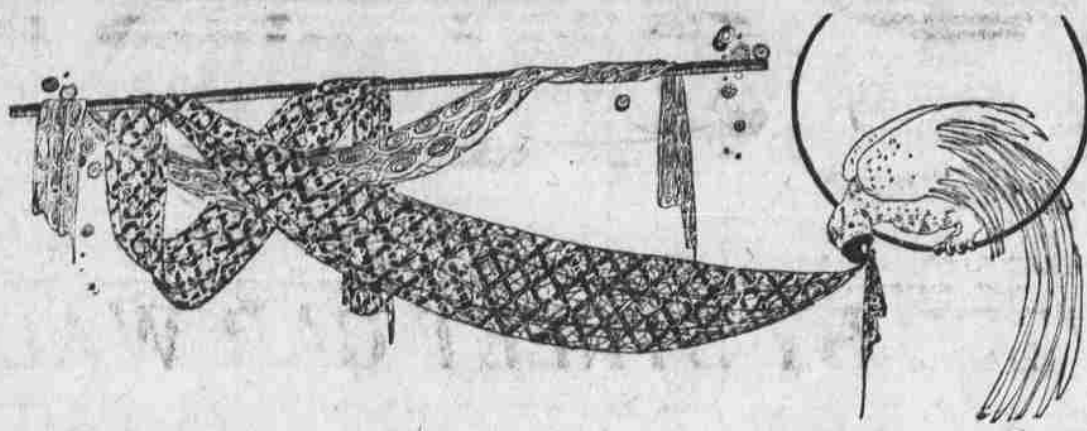

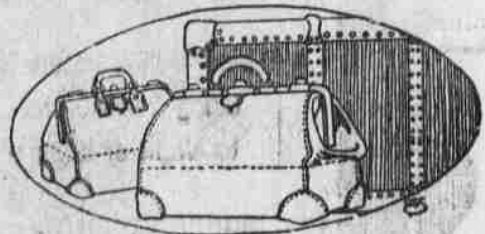

LABOR NOT ASKING FOR VOLSTEAD REPEAL

EVANSTON, Ill., Aug. 1.—Labor men are not clamoring for repeal of the Volstead Act, according to many answers to a questionnaire now being received by the Union Signal, the official publication of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

Taking issue with Samuel Gompers on labor's attitude towards prohibition, John G. Cooper, U. S. Representative, Ohio, for 13 years employed by the Pennsylvania Railroad, and co-day a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers says, "It is not the working people of our country who are clamoring for the repeal of the liquor traffic. It is far from the facts when anyone makes the statement that organized labor as a whole favors the return of wine and beer. I do not challenge the right of Mr. Gompers, or any other leader, to express his own views and sentiments in favor of the repeal of the prohibition laws, but I do challenge the right of anyone to speak for the thousands of working men and women of our country who joined hands with others and banished this un-American institution from the land."

"Ninety-five per cent of the railroad men would vote dry if prohibition were put up to them," is the declaration of J. H. McVenny, secretary and treasurer of Division No. 555 of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Newmarket, Pa.

"The Union labor leader who says that the workingman wants his beer and wine is either a big fool or has invested his money in a brewery and has outlived his usefulness."

"Any so-called labor leader, boss or politician who tries to make the people believe the laboring men are crying for the repeal of the Volstead Law, is an enemy to labor, and like the war profiteer is simply throwing a smoke screen to hide his own contemptible hide."

"The sense of security that an engineer, conductor and dispatcher now has when compared with other days is of such incomparable value to us that even to think of going back to pre-Volstead times will be enough to cause every red-blooded, clean-thinking, true American, two-fisted fighting man, to rise in his might and forever crush this curse of humanity."

Admitting that many of the labor men are not what Billy Sunday would call dry in that they take a drink if it was offered, Mr. McVenny concludes, "Don't let them kid you that we railroad men want booze resurrected. Whoever says we do it is a liar and the truth is not in him."

Warren S. Stone, Grand Chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, expressed it as his opinion that drunkenness has decreased at least 75 per cent among the workers.

"In my study of the labor problems," says Mr. Stone, "I find a marked improvement in the number of men who are saving their money and who own their homes or are buying them. And I find a decided improvement in the home life of workers due to the fact that the women and children have more food, more clothing and better care in every way."

The National Women's Trade Union League, at its annual convention at Waukegan, Illinois, June 19, passed the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the National Women's Trade Union League stands unequivocally for the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment through the laws passed by Congress for this purpose."

EDISTON TELLS OF THE PHONOGRAPH; CALLERS WAIT WHILE HE HUSTLES

WEST ORANGE, N. J., Aug. 1.—(U. P.)—Forty-five years ago on August 12, Thomas A. Edison drew on a piece of paper his first rough sketch of a clumsy music box equipped with a diaphragm cylinder and an organ grinder crank, designed to furnish music power as long as the operator turned it.

The drawing with its scribbled inscription to a workman "Kruess, make this" represented the actual birth of the phonograph, which today representatives of the Edison plants from all over the United States are gathering to celebrate.

While the germ of the idea actually came to Edison on July 18, it was several weeks later before he put it on paper. Followed years of indigo blue and cerise tinted horns and self-announcing records that scratched on every third note, but the machine's development finally reached the rosewood library table, bell-throated, flat disk stage it is now better known by.

"I don't think the radio will ever replace the phonograph," said Edison, in commenting upon his invention. "It mutilates the music. It knows this, for I worked on the radio after the war, using the apparatus we had on the submarines. A low voice or a baritone carries fairly well on the radio, but it is not perfect. Talking is better because of the even pitch."

In accord with his custom, producing instead of prophesying, Edison had nothing to predict as to future developments of the phonograph. He believes he has it close to perfection. At present he is striving for a perfect reproduction of the Ninth Symphony of Beethoven, played by 75 instruments.

"I can't say when I will be able to do this," he explained. "But all things come to him who hustles while he waits."

The original model of the phonograph is now in South Kensington Museum, London. Edison has given it away, as he has done with many of his first models. "I suppose I am not interested in them, because it took so much time and trouble to make them right that I lose the sentiment in them," he added. "It's what is ahead that interests me—not the past."

With stretches of inviting garden and a cool house, sprawling beneath the trees of Llewellyn Park, but a few blocks from his factory, Edison remains staunchly at his desk in the hottest weather.

"He's never home—always at the office," the maid who answers the door bell at his home remarked.

"You'll have to wait to see him," explained a perspiring secretary in the receiving room of the laboratory. "And he's got six people waiting to talk to him ahead of you."

Thus Edison amplifies his maxim and hustles while his callers wait.

WHITE SLAVE ACT DOES NOT APPLY TO WOMEN

DENVER, Aug. 1.—The Mann white slave law is a one-sided affair, according to interpretation by local agents of the federal department of justice and cannot be invoked in cases where women transport men from one state to another.

Two girls were held in jail here several hours while federal agents investigated "white slave" charges. The girls, according to Russell Byron, head of the department of justice here declared they had brought two men to this city from Louisville, Ky., in a big touring car. Byron said the girls admitted paying all the expenses of the trip.

The two girls were taken into custody by federal agents in an alleged "love nest" in this city. The two men were also held temporarily.

The party was released after an investigation disclosed that the federal law does not provide that transportation of men from one state to another by women is illegal.

ITALY SETTLING DOWN TO INDUSTRIAL PEACE

The complete statistics for 1921 show a total of 1945 strikes in which 634,564 workmen participated with the total result of a loss of 7,772,831 working days.
