Fined As Drunk
Joe Pohl was fined \$10 this morning in police court on a charge of being drunk.

Chief Taylor Returns
Chief of Police W. R. Taylor is back on the job after an absence of more than a week. He has been suffering from the effects of erysipelas.

Plan To Sell Buildings
An effort on the part of Indian boys, launched last winter when a number of them requested Rev. J. M. Cornelison to use his office to secure one of the Indian agency buildings as a social gathering room, has failed of its purpose, according to a letter received by the missionary from Charles H. Burke, of the office of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior. "You are advised that this will not be practical. The office is considering the question of selling this entire school plant," Mr. Burke says in his letter to Cornelison.

Endanger Forests' Safety.
The presence of hosts of huckleberry pickers in the forests of the state in their quest for the wild fruit constitute a menace to the safety of the forest unless great precaution is taken with fires, according to J. C. Kuhns, forest supervisor. The state laws in regard to taking every precaution to prevent the spread of fires from camp fires is very stringent, and Mr. Kuhns has requested that those who camp be very careful. The forests are very dry now, and one little fire that gets out of control could easily be responsible for a widespread fire. Fines of from five dollars to \$100 are provided as penalty under state laws for not putting out camp fires or raking away all combustible matter from the camp fire site. To this fine a jail sentence of between two and 50 days may be added. Forest rangers are designated as deputy state fire wardens. They have the power of making use of the services of all armed bodies of men in putting out fires.

Indian Taken to Portland.
Charles Whitford, Indian, was taken to Portland last night by A. Davidson, deputy U. S. marshal. He is charged with having had liquor in his possession on the reservation.

Cover Office Floor.
New linoleum is being placed on the floors of the editorial office of the East Oregonian today. Before the work is completed the floor of the business offices as well will be covered.

H. and H. Shop Changes.
A change in the ownership of the H. and H. shop was announced today. Under the terms of a deal just completed Miss Mabel Hensel sold her interest in the place to Mrs. Minnie M. Henderson, the joint owner. Mrs. Henderson will continue conducting the business as in the past. Miss Hensel will go to California where she will look for a new location.

They Caught A Few
Ralph Stanfield was here today from his home in Echo. During his stay he usually mentioned the fact that he and C. A. Gilbert have just returned from a trip up in Washington. They visited with Asa Thomson at Spokane for a short time and then scooted out to the quiet places for some fishing. They also took care of some business matters on their trip. They got back home Sunday.

Fined for Having Beer.
A fine of \$100 and costs was assessed against John Doe Martin, resident of West Court street, when he appeared before Justice Joe H. Parkes this morning and entered a plea of guilty to a charge of having some beer and wine in his possession. He was arrested Sunday by local and federal officers. John Doe was fined \$10 in Justice Parkes' court on a charge of speeding.

Complete Road Survey.
The preliminary survey of the Ukiah-Dale section of the John Day road has been completed, according to County Roadmaster Lee J. Shannon. R. H. Baldock, and engineer named Farmer and Mr. Shannons were out on the road two days making an examination of conditions that will have to be considered when the road is finally built. No formal report will be ready for some time, according to Shannon.

Fish Die in Pond.
A number of local sportsmen went to Rieth last night where they were bent on transplanting bass from the pond near there into another pond near Barnhart. On their arrival at Rieth they found that they had waited a day or two too long. The fish were practically all dead. Big two and three-pound bass had died. The water where it was not all gone, was not more than six inches in depth and it was extremely hot.

Discover More Fires
Two more fires have been located and charted by the forestry service in the Slick Ear creek district in Washington in the Wenah forest, according to reports from the rangers received by J. C. Kuhns, forest supervisor, this morning. The first fire fighters are doubtful whether they can hold the fire within its present limits. Definite information about the scope of the two new fires could not be ascertained on account of their distance from a telephone.

Is With Boy Scouts
Mansfield Kirby, nephew of H. J. Kirby, an Idaho Falls boy, is with the Pendleton scouts on their vacation to Immigrant Springs. He came to Pendleton specially to make the trip. The boys are having a good time, according to first reports to reach here from there. They are mixing in some baseball with their other sports. Two gloves, a ball bat and some baseballs are a part of the equipment presented them for their vacation fun. The sporting goods were given them by Sol Baum.

Receive Tax Money.
The sum of \$15,936.73 was received yesterday by C. K. Cranston, county treasurer, as the turnover of July taxes from the sheriff's office. Of this amount, \$16,365.05 represents current taxes, and \$2,573.65 is payment made of delinquent taxes. Of this turnover only \$487.58 is for the general road fund, according to Mr. Cranston. The fund is almost exhausted of money at this time, and it is probable that the registering of warrants in the general road fund will soon be a necessity, the treasurer stated. There is still money in the market road fund.

Grocery To Expand.
The Green Grocery, owned by W. W. Green and F. V. Graham and actively managed by Graham, will soon expand. Workmen today are busily engaged in making alterations which will convert the present store-room and the adjoining room, formerly occupied by Welch Bros., into one big room. Several changes in stock will be made when the new enlarged location is ready. New departments will also be added to the present store. The Welch Bros. store one of the oldest in the city, will not be discontinued. The management is looking now for a satisfactory location for the store.

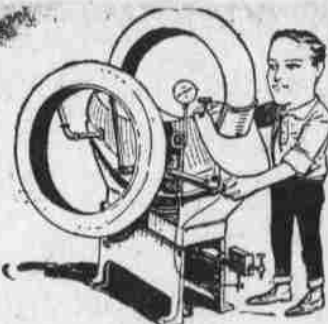
