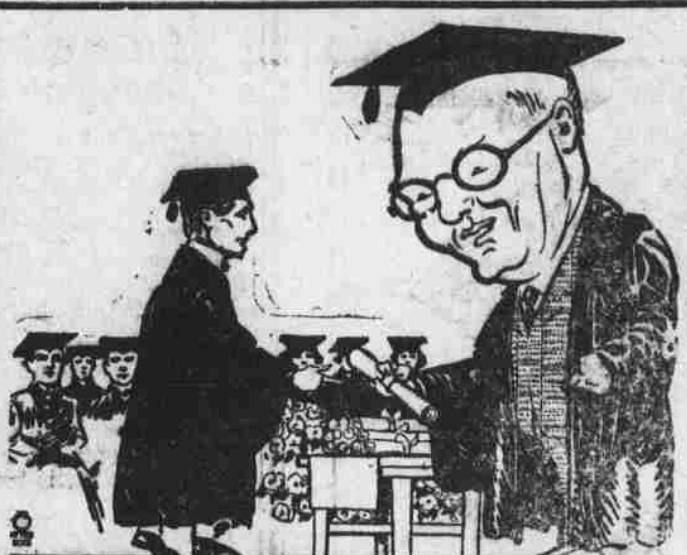
"Shavetails" Crowd Out Higher Rank

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—(U. P.)—Second Lieutenants, the doughboys' burden and the jokesmiths' joy, have come into their own at last. Uncle Sam is throwing colonels, majors and captains out of his army to make room for more of them. When congress last month looked over the army's list of officers, preparatory to making appropriations for their pay, it found that there were less than a hundred second lieutenants in the army, while there were thousands of officers of the higher grades.

So it decided that the army could get along without a few of the upper grades, but needed more "shavetails." It accordingly pared down the authorized numbers of colonels, majors, captains, and first lieutenants and called on the army to commission more seconds, for a grand total of 13,000 officers for the entire army.

The war department has just appointed a "plucking board" of five generals to go over the records of every officer in the army to see who shall be released to make room for the required second lieutenants. It has designated the number of officers in each grade who must be released. The board's selection must be made, and the officers picked be released, before December 15.

When the process is completed, the upper ranks reduced, and the second "toes" inducted into the service, Uncle Sam's army of 125,000 men will be officered by one general, 21 major generals, 46 brigadier generals, 420 colonels, 577 lieutenant colonels, 1,575 majors, 3,150 captains, 2,967 first lieutenants and 1,771 second lieutenants, all officers of the line, and 1,477 officers of all ranks in other branches, such as the Medical, Dental and Veterinary Corps.
