SUBWAY OPENS TO GERMAN COINS

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—(U. S. N.)—Special guards have been placed at many subway stations here to watch for persons putting German five-penny pieces in the fare slots in place of nickels.

Peddlers operating outside subway stations in Manhattan, the Bronx and Brooklyn drove a thriving traffic in five-penny pieces, offering them at 50¢ for \$1, with a whispered tip that the coins would work subway gates "just the same as a nickel." This statement was found to be true.

Passengers entering the subway at 30th and 31st streets, and Broadway were accosted by the peddlers. One woman solicited to buy pennies at 50¢ for \$1 complained to a patrolman on duty nearby, but when accompanied to the station was unable to identify persons said to have accosted her. It was later learned that similar offers of pennies for use at numerous gates had been made at numerous stations in three boroughs.

The penny is normally worth 10¢ to the mark, which is now quoted at 60¢ to the dollar. Owing to depreciation of German currency it is said to be now possible to acquire a sackful of five-penny pieces for a dollar in Hamburg and other German ports. Information was obtained that a heavy influx of small German coins has been taking place since direct sailings between American and German ports was resumed some months ago.

The five-penny piece, so closely resembling a nickel, is said to have been imported by sailors employed on these vessels. Efforts to learn the extent of losses suffered through coin substitution by transportation companies in clot gates and coin receptacles such as are used on the Interborough and B. R. T. systems proved unavailing. It was admitted that considerable substitution is taking place daily, but no definite statement as to losses entailed could be had.

MANY YOUTHS ENROLLED IN LIVESTOCK CLUBS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—A total of 132,441 boys and girls were enrolled in agricultural extension clubs in 1921 for training in various phases of livestock work, according to the department of agriculture.

The junior farmers last year owned 78,148 head of farm animals and 534,286 fowls, representing an aggregate value of \$2,602,176.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—(U. P.)—In a field of sport where all new strategy was supposed to have been exhausted years ago, baseball this year has sprung a new one.
Since the time when there were more than nine men available on a team, the pinch-hitter has become an institution of smart baseball, but it remained for 1922 to develop the pinch pitcher.
L. B. Fuld, the wise manager of the St. Louis Browns, was the first one this season to resort to this new strategy.

At a critical moment in the recent crucial series between the Browns and the Yanks, Gohl derrieked the sensational young "Shanks" Fuld, after he had fanned Babe Ruth for the third time.
The fans couldn't understand the reason for the move when Van Gilder, a big right hander was sent in to pitch to Menzel.

"I wanted a right hand pitcher to pitch to a right hand batter. That's simple," Fuld said when asked to explain the strategy. It worked, too.

Kid Gleason then came along with example No. 2 and it started the most

interesting battle of managerial wits that has been seen on the Polo Grounds.

It was the last half of the ninth inning with the White Sox leading the Yanks 7 to 4.

Ruth walked to start the inning. Menzel and Schang went out, making it two down. Ward and Scott singled, filling the bases. "No Hit" Robertson was pitching. The weak hitting McNally was coming up when Huggins sent in Frank Baker to bat for him. Gleason dashed out and ordered Southpaw Ferd Schupp to relieve Robertson. Huggins jerked Baker back and sent in Fred Hoffman, a right hand batter, for Baker. Schupp got rattled and walked Hoffman, forcing in a run.

Murray, a young pitcher, was due at the bat, but Huggins jerked him and sent in Miller, a right hander, to bat. Gleason called for a right hand pitcher and young Huggins trotted in from the bull pen. Huggins again countered by pulling back Miller and sending in Lefty O'Doul, a left hand batter. O'Doul smacked out a single and scored two runs, tying the score.

The battle of wits might have been continued but both Gleason and Huggins were out of players and they had to finish according to Hoyle, the White Sox finally winning in the eleventh by the crack of Amos Strunk, Gleason's last pinch hitter.
