Winter wheat yield per acre 4.2; indicated crop, 542,000,000.

Wheat—Failure of a food export business to develop with the reopening of Liverpool, and the belief that government reports after the close would be rather bullish. Liverpool failed to reflect our full decline, and there was a small rally early, but when corn weakened wheat followed. There is a strong probability of further railroad strike, while the coal strike will probably be settled in the near future. The various influences are so conflicting that prices will probably fluctuate in a most irregular manner for some time to come. A settlement of the rail strike would in the end probably be bullish as the producer has ceased to sell freely, and the trade will be disappointed over the receipts. The car shortage is getting more acute daily. There are some very bullish estimates being received on the Canadian crop which promises to materially exceed last year's.

Hickey replied with a bullet which shattered Morgan's rifle, injuring his arm. At the same time Hickey's rifle fired, Horton shiner staggering him. Hickey fired a second shot, dropping Horton, mortally wounding him. A third shot plowed through Morgan's scalp as the latter raced for shelter. Pickett meanwhile sought aid, and Morgan presently joined him at Stevenson, where a posse was organized, and Hickey was found dying by his still, shot through the groin. Hans Hanson, suspected of being Hickey's partner, Harold Ahola and E. L. Knight, farmers, were arrested. None of these were present at the time of the shooting it was said.

CURSE CARRIED OVER THREE GENERATIONS

LONDON, Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—A curse that has not lost its potency in three generations was brought to light at the inquest at Nottingham on a baby.

The family doctor stated that the child, like its mother and grandmother, had been born with only one finger on each hand and one toe on each foot.

Mrs. Anne Carter, the grandmother, explained the origin of the deformity.

"Shortly before my birth," she said, "my father cursed my mother because she interfered with his stocking-making machine.

"I hope your baby will be born without fingers or toes," he said. "He was frantic when he learned I had only two fingers and two toes, and he never really recovered from the shock."

Mrs. Carter was the only one of a family of seven to be born abnormal, but three of her eighteen children inherited her deformity. The baby was her first grandchild.

SUBTERRANEAN RIVER FOUND

GENEVA, Aug. 8.—(A. P.)—A great subterranean river, with an outflow of 67,000 gallons of water a minute, has been discovered in the Mont Blanc region. Known as Eau Belles, this river has thrown out many underground tributaries which have formed small lakes and wells of extremely pure and cold water in the southern districts of France and in Switzerland. The origin of the river is the ancient lower glaciers of Mont Blanc which it has been proved flow from the bottom as well as the top, the latter supplying indirectly the Rhone and the Rhine. The waters of Eau Belles at a depth of 25 to 50 yards beneath the mountains have carved out wonderful and beautiful caverns, grottoes and colorless full of stalactites and stalagmites.
