MANY LETTERS INDORSE FORD FOR PRESIDENT

DETROIT, Aug. 8.—(I. N. S.)—Every state except Maine, New Mexico and Nevada has been heard from in the form of unsolicited letters endorsing Henry Ford for president of the United States, officers of the "Ford for President Club" at Dearborn report.

State clubs are being organized and the Ford "boom" will be placed upon a firm foundation long before the 1924 campaign.
