POLICE HANDLE CROWDS ATTRACTED BY 'MIRACLE'

SAN JUAN, P. R., Aug. 11.—(A. P.)—Extra policemen have been detailed for duty at San Lorenzo to help handle the crowds drawn there from Wednesday night to late Friday each week by the stories of apparent cures by Julia Yaguez, the "healer" of San Lorenzo.

Hundreds, if not thousands, of automobiles carrying the sick, lame, and curious have been visiting San Lorenzo and so great have been the traffic jams that there have been complaints to the police that the San Lorenzo road was impassable. On Thursday last there was a line of motors two miles long on each side of the roadway waiting for people who are rapidly wearing into a broad trail the cow path that leads up the steep hills to the spring, from which the supposedly healing waters come.

Thousands go by motor to the "healer" and more thousands on foot. From Caguas and other nearby towns there has sprung up a regular motor service to and from the place of "Miracles." People go by truck loads. They go in carriages, carts and some are carried. Stories of "miracles" are spread with wonderful rapidity thru the crowd each day, and there are reports of people coming from Santo Domingo or the Virgin Islands to get the waters blessed by the "healer." Some make a fiesta of it; others are almost reverential.

The healing spring is about a mile from the town where the "healer" lives. Near the spring a palm-covered pavilion sheltering 400 to 500 people has been erected. There Thursdays and Fridays the healer sits in a chair on a raised platform and receives the sick. Waters from the spring lack healing qualities until she has blessed or magnetized them. After being blessed the water is carried away in bottles, buckets, oil cans, anything. And each person the "healer" sees is told to bathe, rub the afflicted portion of the body with the water, or drink so much of it at certain times.

Frequently the "healer" is aroused from her trances with great difficulty. Her father and a brother assist her. Her "power" is supposed to have been passed on to her while the spring waters for many years have been reputed to have healing qualities. It was about two months ago that the "healer" first attracted attention. Since then her fame has spread throughout the island.

CROPS DECLINE DURING JULY IN OREGON KENT DECLARES IN REPORT

Wheat Yield Estimated to be Above Five Year Average; Fruits Register Losses.

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—"Better than we expected" is the report of most growers of winter wheat who have threshed their 1922 crop, but a further decline in the condition of practically all other crops during the month of July, is the August 1, Oregon crop situation, according to F. L. Kent, agricultural statistician of the bureau of agricultural economics, United States department of agriculture.

The winter wheat harvest began about two weeks earlier than usual in some parts of the state. A very large percentage of the crop had been threshed by August 1, particularly in the western district. In the principal wheat producing counties nearly a third of the crop was in the sack on August 1. The quality of the crop is generally good. Mill operators state that the milling quality of the winter wheat is the best in many years. While there is some light weight wheat, due largely to hot weather conditions the crop as a whole will doubtless grade well up to the average.

Average yield per acre for the state as a whole is estimated at 19.9 bushels, or a total production of about 16,300,000 bushels, compared with an estimate of 20,800,000 bushels last year, and a five year average of 14,867,000 bushels.

The United States winter wheat crop for 1922 is now estimated at 541,400,000 bushels, being a decrease from the July 1 estimate of about 580,000,000 bushels. The 1921 U. S. crop was finally estimated at 557,032,000 bushels and the five year average is 550,450,000 bushels.

The Oregon spring wheat crop is estimated at 62 per cent of a normal condition. This condition would be much lower except for the fact that a good June rain occurred in some of the larger spring wheat growing sections, and the further fact that there is considerable spring wheat grown on irrigated lands. The Oregon crop will probably amount to about 3,000,000 bushels. The Washington state crop is estimated at about 12,000,000 bushels, with a 50 per cent of normal condition.

The United States spring wheat crop showed some improvement during the month of July, and is now estimated at 203,392,000 bushels, which is an increase of about 10,000,000 bushels over the estimate of a month ago. The 1921 crop was finally estimated at 207,851,000 bushels and the five year average is 243,600,000 bushels.

Condition of the Oregon oats crop declined during July to the low figure of 60 per cent of normal, and the figure would be still lower except for a heavier than usual seeding of winter oats last fall. The present condition figure indicates a probable production of about 6,400,000. The 1921 production was estimated at 5,704,000 bushels, and the five year average is 9,735,000 bushels.

The United States oat crop condition improved slightly during the month of July, and the 1922 crop is now forecasted at 1,251,156,000 bushels. The 1921 crop was estimated at 1,061,000,000 bushels, and the five year average at 1,374,382,000 bushels. Condition of the Oregon barley crop is estimated at 78 per cent of normal, indicating a probable production of about 2,000,000 bushels. The 1921 crop was estimated at 2,240,000 bushels and the five year average is 3,176,000 bushels.

The United States barley crop showed practically no change in condition during July, and is now forecasted at 1,131,507,000 bushels, compared with 1,211,181,000 bushels last year, and a five year average of 1,012,000 bushels.

Oregon potato prospects declined during the month of July, the estimated August 1 condition figure being 75 per cent of normal. Reports of acreage planted indicate about a 7.0 per cent increase over last year's acreage, but the present condition of the crop does not indicate any increase in the total production over 1921. Malheur county reports about 8000 acres in early crop, compared with 800 acres last year. The Malheur potatoes were ready for market about July 20, but the demand was very light. The Her-

miston district began selling about July 15.

Condition of the United States crop on August 1, was estimated at 84.3 per cent of normal, indicating a probable production of about 410,000,000 bushels, compared with the five year average estimate of 373,000,000 bushels.

Except where irrigation is practiced it is believed that the long continued dry weather will result in small sized fruit (apples, pears, and plums). A month ago we estimated the Oregon Commercial Apple crop at 5545 carloads, and the Commercial Pear crop at about 1300 carloads. The prevailing weather conditions will quite likely reduce these crops. Prunes continue to drop, even in some of the best cultivated orchards, and the small sizes will doubtless predominate at harvest time. The production of cherries was much below normal, particularly the Royal Ann crop. In the western part of the state, The Lane County Royal Ann production has been estimated at only about one-third that of last year. Raspberries ripened very quickly, due to the hot dry days at picking time, resulting in fruit of inferior quality, and an abnormal demand for pickers. The marketed yield per acre was much below the average this year.

BANDITS ROB MAN WHO RIDES WITH STRANGER

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 11.—Joseph W. Oheim, who complained to the police that he was held up by three bandits while he was driving in his machine, is not grieving over the loss of \$12 taken from his pockets, but the bold robbers drove away in Oheim's car with his girl.

His car was later found by the police. Oheim could not give the girl's name to the police, as he had known her only a "short while."
