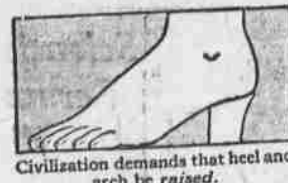

JAPAN IS PRUSSIA OF FAR EAST, IS CHARGE

MOSCOW, Aug. 16.—(U. N. S.)—Japan is the Prussia of the Far East," M. Marlevski, Soviet Russian representative at the recent Dairen negotiations, said upon his return to Moscow.

"Negotiations at Dairen were broken off by Japan's attempt to make a colony out of the Far Eastern Republic and demanding the right to send military missions everywhere and refusing the Far Eastern Republic the

right to its own fleet or to admit Russian warships into the harbor at Vladivostok," Marlevski said.

The Russian delegate charged that Japan has assisted the Chinese civil war makers and that three Japanese divisions are ready to go into Manchuria when necessary.

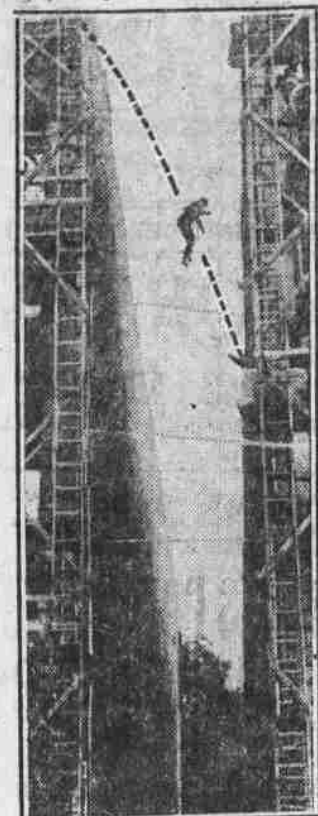
Human Bird Suit Will Be Tested By Its Inventor

PARIS, Aug. 16.—(U. N. S.)—Practical tests of the human bird suit, invented by Dr. Magnan, will be made at Dieppe in a few weeks. The apparatus which Dr. Magnan has constructed to attach to the human body weighs less than 150 pounds. It consists of two wings less than a yard long and a fuselage and tail.

"For years I have been observing birds and their flight," explains the inventor. "I have discovered nothing. I have simply observed and noted my observations. It is possible that I have made mistakes in my deductions." Mr. Magnan describes the results of his years of work to the editor of the sporting newspaper L'Auto.

"In the first place gliding flight and sailing flight are too often confused. Gliding signifies to take advantage of an angle of fall; sailing

means to depart from a given point and, profiting by the wind, to reach a height superior to that of the start.

Observes Scaglioli, "I have observed thousands of seagulls. These birds take off from a high point, get a good start on the fall and then turn their faces into the wind. They then shorten the length of their neck, contracting it. This changes the center of balance, inclining their bodies to the rear and raising the tails. It is in this manner that a bird attacks an air wave and progresses."

"After the wave has been passed the bird lengthens his neck, which shifts the center of gravity toward the front. The body is lengthened and the tail is lowered. This is the position of the volplane, or gliding. The combination of these two positions is repeated time after time as the bird strikes the air wave. It is the combination of the two which brings the bird forward through the air without flapping its wings."

"Of course while progress is made it is made in an undulating up and down and sideways line. Frequently the curve is almost imperceptible. The bird's wings do not beat during this operation, but on the other hand they do not rest motionless. The ends of the wings are in constant motion, but by dissection I have demonstrated that there are no muscles attached to the ends. The motion is caused by the air."

Makes Experiments. "This is what I have observed by sailing on the wing as contrasted with gliding. Of course many experiments have already been made with gliding. Let me add that the birds have wings which are very supple; I almost said soft. The delicacy of the wings warns the bird of the changing currents of air. The device I have arranged for my human bird to take the place of this characteristic of birds' wings is an anemometer stream which whistles with the changing of the pressure of the wind waves and advises the man bird when he should glide and when he should sail."

Dr. Magnan intends to do the first experimenting himself, but has secured the services of a famous French aviator who has himself done much research work in the field of volplane. If the first tryouts at Dieppe promise success Dr. Magnan will continue the experimenting at Calais.

TWO PUREBRED JERSEY BULLS ON LONG TRIP

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 16.—From Spokane to Bombay, India, approximately 12,000 miles by rail and water, is the trip commenced recently by two 6-months-old purebred Jersey bulls from a local farm. They were shipped by express from here to Brooklyn, N. Y., and sailed from that city yesterday on the city of Sparta.

ART COLONY LURES RICH HEIRESS FROM PLACE IN SOCIETY

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Automobiles, maids, "social position" and the like mean little to Mrs. Stanislaus Szukalski, formerly Miss Helen Walker, daughter of one of Chicago's wealthiest families.

She has gladly surrendered her place in the home of her father, Dr. J. S. Walker, of Chicago's famous "gold coast," to abide with her ultra-modern sculptor husband in a top story flat of cramped dimensions in Greenwich Village, New York.

She, too, is an artist, and she met "Stan," as she calls him, at an art school here. She fell in love with him, long hair and all, and when the budding romance received the parental O. K. which it did, contrary to most fiction of a kindred trend, they were wed, and returned to the scenes amid which they were first mutually enamored.

Mrs. Szukalski has persistently eschewed the granting of interviews, explaining that she and her husband will refuse to be lionized by society, preferring their art instead, but the irrepressible joy of Stanislaus caused him to exclaim:

"Here we are, ready to work together and accomplish success. Helen is a delightful artist and we are very interested in our art. She is my personal inspiration."

Mrs. "Stan" attributes the success of her more recent art works to her husband in the same generous fashion in which he calls her his "inspiration."

"Since Stan and I met in New York in the art school my work has improved," she asserted. "I exhibited my work in Chicago and I owe what praise I got to my husband. He is an exponent of the new school in art and sculpture. It is not our intention to lead a Bohemian life nor to be lionized in society. Here in this quiet studio, which I think is ideal, I am going to bury myself in my work."

Szukalski has been a resident of the artist colony of Greenwich Village for a number of years. A year ago he attracted the attention of Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, who arranged to exhibit his work. From that point forward his popularity throughout the nation has developed.

Mrs. Szukalski was to have been the one and only attendant to Miss Mary Landon Baker on one of the occasions when the Chicago heiress was to have married Allister McCormick.

TYPISTS PAID LESS THAN HOUSE MAIDS IN FRENCH CAPITAL

PARIS, Aug. 16.—Maid of all work are better paid in France than stenographers, points out La Presse, summing up an analysis of women's wages.

It isn't that the French "bonne" gets much money for her long days of hard work. It is that money is not worth so much these days as food and lodging, which a reasonable amount of money no longer will buy.

A French stenographer earns, after about a year as a "debutante"—the word is strange to American ears used in this sense—about \$50 a month, out of which she must pay, according to La Presse, \$12 for a room, \$27 for food, \$5 for clothes, \$1.50 for carfare, \$2 for heat, \$1.50 for laundry and incidentals, \$2. The total, pitifully little even from French standards, amounts nevertheless to more than the amount received, or \$55.

The "servant girl," on the other hand, continues La Presse, is paid at least \$17 a month, with board, room and laundry free. Grant her \$7 for maintenance and incidentals, and she is left with \$10 a month saved.

"Only prejudice keeps girls from housework nowadays," concludes the article.

Both servant girls and stenographers say, however, that only circumstances and immigration difficulties keep them from America.

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WILL CONDUCT CAMPAIGN TO GET VETERANS JOBS

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 16.—For the purpose of securing employment for disabled war veterans who have been rehabilitated, vocationally, a campaign will be conducted through out the northwest August 21 to 25 by the U. S. Veterans' Bureau, according to A. E. McCabe, district head of the newly organized employment section of the bureau. More than 900 veterans of the bureau, Oregon and Idaho have completed their training courses and several hundred more are scheduled to finish their vocational work within the next two or three months, he stated.

"These fellows who could not carry on their pre-war vocations because of war injuries surely deserve consideration in the matter of employment," said Mr. McCabe. "They have struggled for months and in many cases years to master a new occupation. However, we are not asking employers to hire these veterans for sentimental reasons but rather because they are now capable office workers, tradesmen or industrial workers. The Veterans' Bureau vouches that the rehabilitated service men will hold down the job he is recommended for."

Employers are urged to get in touch with one of the branch offices of the Veterans' Bureau located in Seattle, Portland, Spokane, Tacoma, Eugene and Pocatello during "Veterans' Employment Week."
