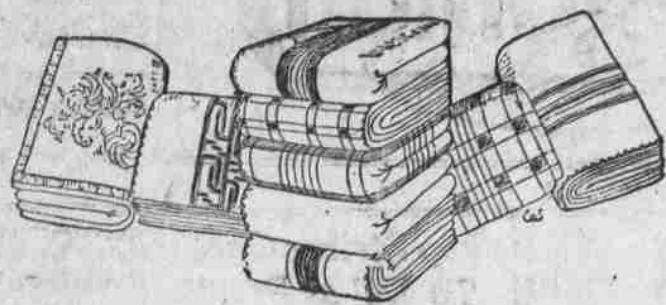

WAR SURPLUS USED TO BUILD HIGHWAYS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Up to July 1 surplus war materials valued at \$129,772,986, was delivered to the states for use in road construction, according to a report of the bureau of public roads of the agriculture department.

The material, which consisted of all sorts of supplies and equipment suitable for road building for which the

war department had no further need, was distributed on the same basis as monetary federal aid.

New York and Texas lead in value of material delivered, with nearly \$3,000,000 worth, and every state with the exception of five of the smaller ones, received supplies valued at more than \$1,000,000.

"This material has been of great value in road construction," said an official of the bureau of public roads "and there is hardly a county in the United States in which some of it has not been used."

"Probably of greatest value has been the 29,325 motor vehicles distributed, consisting of 24,752 trucks and 4,573 automobiles and, in addition,

a large number of tractors." The system of distribution, the bureau said, has been so arranged that the states requisition only material useful to them. In some cases they fall behind in allotments in order to wait for material particularly desired. Great ingenuity has been shown by many states in conditioning worn equipment, using war material to equip shops in which other war material is made suitable for use, according to government observers. A large quantity of material still remains in the United States for distribution, the bureau stated. This will be further increased by supplies used by the army of occupation in Germany soon to be brought back.

PACIFIC COAST FAIR SEASON IS OPENING

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 18.—(U. P.)—Roll in the monster pumpkin and tie pink ribbons on the fatted calf—state fair season is open on the Pacific Coast. From Vancouver in British Columbia to the southern borders of California, and including the confined of Idaho and far Montana, your rustic youth is priming the spotted colt with selected oats, and prize cows are switching their tails with conscious pride.

British Columbia opens the festivities with a provincial fair at Vancouver August 19-26. With that opened under their belts, fair fans will turn their eyes toward California, which exerts in fair style at Sacramento September 2 to 19. Then to British Columbia again, where a second provincial fair will blossom forth at New Westminster September 11 to 16.

Washington tosses its stately champagne into the ring on September 15, when for a week city and county folks of that and surrounding states will mingle at Yakima, over in the wheat belt.

The week of September 25 to 30 will be a busy one for those folks who make their living by attending state fairs.

Oregon opens its state fair at Salem September 25, and on the same day Montana and Idaho kick their gates wide, Montana holding forth at Helena and Idaho doing its stuff at Boise. It is interesting to note that of all the states holding fairs, Washington is the only one not holding its fair at the state capital.

LOSE JOBS BECAUSE OF 'FATAL BEAUTY'

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 18.—(U. P.)—Six Detroit girls are out of work because they are so pretty.

Summer Heat Causes Vice-President to Forget the Names of 3 Senators

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—(U. P.)—Vice President Coolidge, the "memory expert" of the senate, seldom errs in recognizing senators, but the hot weather recently caused him to make three blunders, to the amusement of the galleries and embarrassment of the senators.

The vice president, with the necessity of keeping the names and home states of ninety-six senators constantly in mind, can get excited. His memory, however, slipped the other day when he recognized Senator La Follette, R., of Wisconsin, as the "Senator from Minnesota." La Follette ignored the recognition, calling again to the chair until the vice president realized his mistake and gave the noted Wisconsin senator his correct "address."

Closely following this slip Coolidge called Pat Harrison, democratic leader from Mississippi, the "Senator from Louisiana." Harrison, however, smilingly passed by the error and began his speech.

The third mistake came a little later when the vice president referred to Senator King, D., of Utah, as the "Senator from Idaho." King like Harrison, ignored the mistake.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—(U. P.)—Joseph Jaffee, sixty-one, knows what a horse looks like now. Absolutely!

FILIPINO CLERKS MESS UP ASSESSMENT ROLLS

MANILA, Aug. 18.—Farmers in the United States who have cause to complain over taxes will sympathize with their fellows in the Philippines, where the new assessment upon which to base the bond issue authorized by Congress was made in some provinces overnight by clerks working for fifty cents per night. The old assessment rolls were distributed to them and they were told that Manila demanded an average increase of at least 50 per cent.

So the earnest clerks went to work, with fearful results. Some increases amount to 2,000 per cent, some to very little but many to 200 to 300 per cent. An American's cattle pasture formerly valued at \$475 was raised to \$7,781.

FORTIFIED CITY IS FRENCH CURIOSITY

CARCASSONE, Aug. 18.—"See Carcassonne before you die" is an old French proverb which American visitors to France will do well to heed. Destined to command the ways of communication between the Atlantic and the Mediterranean, Carcassonne, one of the greatest curiosities in the world, is built about midway between the Pyrenees and the Black mountains on the ruins of an ancient Roman fortress.

It is not only a fortified castle but a city entirely fortified, high on the hills overlooking the beautiful Aude valley. Its double walls are almost a complete course of instruction in the art of fortification from the fifth century to the seventeenth.

In the first place it was an "oppidum kelticum" and then a Roman castle. The Visigoths came and made it a fortress, which they kept until the year 725, when the Moors from Spain chased them out. The Counts of Toulouse then made it their stronghold until 1249, when Saint Louis besieged and took it. He completed its system of defense and rebuilt the ramparts and a new fortress on the opposite side of the Aude. Several more centuries of struggle and the glorious history of the fortress was ended. During the late war German prisoners occupied it.

There are 1000 inhabitants inside the two great walls with their houses and shops just as in an ordinary village, centered about the old cathedral of St. Nazaire, where one can see the gargoyles known as "The Tiger" in which Clemenceau, who represents Carcassonne in the French chamber, found himself.

Every summer the Comedie Francaise gives a series of productions in a grassy amphitheatre under these historic walls, against the fifty-three towers and embattlements of this unique stronghold. It is as Hamlet on a still moonlight night in July, or Macbeth descending the narrow stairs from the Bishop's tower, is to recapture the romance of the Middle Ages.

WIFE WON'T BUY ROUGE FOR HIM; HUSBY ROUGH

DETROIT, Aug. 18.—"He threw me downstairs because I refused to buy rouge," Mrs. Victoria Grunstein testified before Judge Richter in her suit for divorce against Frank Grunstein.
