EXPECT INSPECTIONS TO DOUBLE DURING 1922

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—During the fiscal year ending June 30 state inspectors in the Yakima valley of Washington inspected nearly 1400 cars of fruit and vegetables, divided as follows: Potatoes 1556 cars, apples 1282 cars, pears 159 cars, onions 74 cars, peaches 14 cars, strawberries and cherries each 2 cars, and asparagus 1 car. The U. S. department in agriculture cooperated in this inspection service.

Present indications are that the number of inspections this season will be double the number made last year. This is evidence of satisfaction on the part of shippers with the cooperative inspection work in the Yakima valley.

This season 1400 certificates to be issued will be joint state and federal certificates.

Local estimates for the crops in the three counties of the valley this year are 12,000 cars of apples, 7000 cars of potatoes, 1200 cars of peaches, and about 1500 cars of pears, although a large part of the pears will go to canneries.

Joe Hanister of Echo visited in Athena a few days last week. Mr. Hanister was returning from Pullman, Wash., after visiting relatives there.

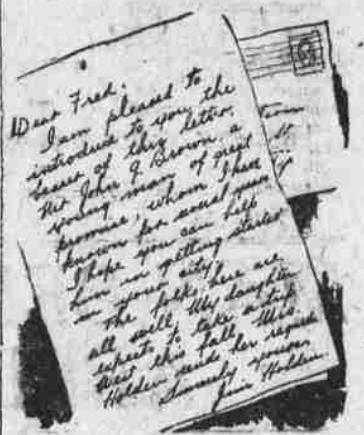
