BEER PRICES IN PARIS DEPENDS ON THE PLACE

PARIS, Aug. 25.—How much is a glass of beer in Paris. All depends upon where you buy it. Not long ago a certain citizen amused himself by making a tour of many cafes and keeping a record of the price, which varied from four to forty cents. Later, by this same individual has been carrying on other investigations, and has

found a cafe which charges about four cents for anything you care to drink, be it beer, coffee, wine or extra stout. This is a novel idea, and the cafe is probably the only one of its kind to be found in the capital.

GERMANY TO GUARANTEE REPARATIONS PAYMENTS

BERLIN, Aug. 25.—(U. P.)—Sir John Bradbury and M. Maule, representing the allied reparations committee, left for Paris today with Germany's moratorium plan. Sessions between Maule, Bradbury and Chancellor Wirth adjourned immediately after the German government submitted its plan of direct treaties between German industrialists and France and Belgium which would guarantee the payment of reparations after the moratorium.

'WIRELESS TAPPERS' CAUGHT IN GERMANY

HAMBURG, Aug. 25.—A secret wireless station was detected here by the police. The owners, two Hamburg engineers, picked up stock exchange news from the air and sold their information to stockbrokers and banks for enormous prices. A New York flash cost the clients about 10,000 marks. The operators are said to have given exceedingly good "tips."

AVALANCHE OF TINNED MEATS HITS GERMANY

BERLIN, Aug. 25.—Germany is being flooded by offers of American firms of tinned meat at half the price of the fresh German meat. In consequence of the enormous rise of prices Berlin now consumes half as much meat as in the previous two months. Hundreds of butcher shops had to close, and about 500 butchers quit working altogether.
