Special Rates Given

For the Round-Up, the Northern Pacific Railway has made a rate of one and one half fare from all points from Missoula, Montana, and west. The selling dates are September 20 to 23, with a return limit September 25. These are the first Round-Up rates offered since the war.

New Born Faun Found

A new born faun was found recently on Hell Hole Creek, by R. A. Lent, sheep herder employed by Frank Sloan. Mr. Lent is of the opinion that the faun died immediately after being born. Mr. Lent reports a scarcity of deer and bear on the range but that grouse are plentiful. The hatch, he states, was large, there being from 10 to 15 in every bunch.

Their deer hunting was done in Curry county near Snow Camp, and it is necessary to use two or three blankets there

at night to sleep under if one wishes to keep warm, the men declare. At the coast they caught some big salmon, and incidentally, they found a lot of fleas that were "just waiting for some Eastern Oregon tenderfeet" to come along, according to G. W. Coutts. Hamley stopped at Portland for a brief visit before returning to Pendleton.

A deal was closed yesterday whereby John O'Meara becomes the possessor of three pieces of property. He now owns five properties in Pendleton and declares that this strikes him as being a good time to invest in local property. Dayton & Dayton made the deals.

A wreck on the G. W. R. & N. branch between Pendleton and Walla Walla is held responsible for the diverting of traffic by way of Umatilla. A locomotive train is said to have left the track, but how serious the wreck was and where it was could not be ascertained at the station this afternoon.

Three building permits have been taken out at the office of the city recorder during the past 24 hours. D. Cowan will build a chicken house on his property, 115 Garden street, to cost \$10. J. De Wilde will remodel his dwelling at 309 Thompson street at a cost of \$100. W. B. Hale secured a permit for the making of improvements to the extent of \$1,500 on his property, 406 East Alta street.

Carpenters All to Parade

When labor celebrates its day here September 4 and enjoys itself the carpenters of Pendleton will turn out just 100 per cent strong for the big parade which is to be one of the spectacular features of the day's festivities. Action to this effect was taken last night by the carpenters, and they declare that they will be in the parade in work regalia in such numbers as to show their colors. The plans for the celebration are developing in an ideal manner, according to Sandy McLain, a member of the general committee.

Little Wheat Is Sold

The movement of wheat from the farm to the buyer is very slow this fall, according to local grain buyers. Quite a lot of wheat has been shipped to date, but practically all of it is that which was purchased on contract. Some of the crop is now moving, however, on direct sale. The price that has ruled here during the past few days has been between 95 and 97 cents the bushel, basis No. 1, club, according to local grain men. One buyer stated this morning that he does not expect the crop to move very rapidly until the price goes up, or until there is a recession of prices that will hold good for some time. The attitude of the farmer is to hold, and the demand as reflected in the market, is not very keen.

N. Y. FIRM MAY ENTER RUSSIAN FUR EXPORT ON EXTENSIVE SCALE

MOSCOW, Aug. 29.—A five million dollar corporation for the export of furs from Russia is under consideration by the Soviet government.

Formation of the corporation has been proposed by Hershkowitz, a New York furrier.

Hershkowitz proposes that the stock company shall be owned half by Americans and half by the Soviet government.

The government considers the offer as favorable and representatives of the American capitalists, who proposed that the corporation, recently were at Novonikolaevsk conferring with Soviet representatives.

CALIFORNIA VOTERS PASS JUDGMENT ON HIRAM JOHNSON TODAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—(I. N. 1).—The political crisis of the nation, which of late have been quite busy burning from one State primary to another, were focused today as voters of the Golden State wended their way to the polls to register their verdict on Senator Hiram Johnson.

The senior Senator in opposition to renomination by Charles C. Moore, wealthy business man, leading olive power of the state and best known as president of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition.

Johnson's supporters predicted an overwhelming victory for the senator.

Moore Camp Optimistic
Moore's backers' professed confidence, however, and declared that the ballot were counted there could be a surprising upset of the dope.

Senator Johnson himself has never felt the campaign to be in doubt. The day he arrived a little over a month ago to begin his campaign he declared:

"It is the same old fight against the same old gang, and it will be the same result."

Forthwith he plunged into a speaking campaign which has taken him from one end of the state to the other, bringing to bear all his old-time fire and enthusiasm. Immense crowds have greeted him wherever he went, this being particularly true in Southern California, claimed by Moore's backers to favor the latter's candidacy.

Throughout the campaign Senator Johnson has never mentioned the name of his opponent, referring to him always as the "vicarious candidate." However, he has attacked Moore's backers without mercy.

"I stand on my record," Senator Johnson told his audiences. "I have no apologies to make concerning my stand on the League of Nations issue and the Four Power Pact."

Much of the backing of Moore admittedly is the element that favored Herbert Hoover two years ago against Johnson and supported the League of Nations.

"The interests fighting me really are fighting the people of California and the progressive and humanitarian laws this state won after a long, hard battle," Senator Johnson declared during the course of his campaign.

Senator Johnson's successful fight for tariff protection for California products has aligned much support behind him that in years gone by favored other candidates.

There is little interest in the Democratic primaries, there being but one contest.

Friend K. Richardson is contesting the renomination of Governor W. D. Stephens in the Republican primaries, and several other hot contests are on, notably for the State Treasurership.

PRISONER TO RAISE FINE BY WORK OUTSIDE JAIL

J., introduced the novel scheme of allowing a prisoner lacking full payment of his fine to work it out in employment outside the jail.
