Kingstonians Coming.
There will be a delegation of between 20 and 30 people come to the Round-Up this year from Port Townsend, Washington, according to a letter that has been received by Secretary C. I. Barr of the Pendleton Commercial association from a member of party seeking information about dates and prices for the show.

Uphill to See Show.
President Prince L. Campbell of the University of Oregon, will be in Pendleton all three days of the Round-Up year, according to a letter which has been received by Bert Jerard. This is the first time President Campbell has been able to get to Pendleton for the big show and he is anticipating the thrills on his initial venture.

Raze Building.
The old frame building on East street now occupied by Ray Carrolls repair shop will be razed in a short time, according to information received by Fire Chief W. Ringold. The building is said to be about 40 years old. For many years it housed a laundry and it was the home of a restaurant. The building is to be torn down as a fire hazard, and is one of several on which the same action has been taken.

An invitation to sing at the luncheon which the Pendleton Rotary club give in honor of the meeting of the Northwest Conference of Rotarians here next Wednesday, has been accepted by Jane Burns Albert, according to a letter of acceptance received from the singer this morning. Fined For Trespass.
Charles Z. Randall, deputy district attorney, was in Milton yesterday where he represented the state in a case against William Brock, charged with trespass. The case was tried in Justice Miller's court, and a fine of \$25 and costs was assessed against the defendant.

Sues On Notes.
The First National bank of Pendleton has brought suit in circuit court against J. W. Collins to collect on several notes claimed to be past due and unpaid. Judgment for \$2,187.20 is asked in addition to interest and attorney fees. Carter and Smythe represent the bank.

To Try Case Tomorrow.
The case of Charles Martin, charged with the illegal possession of liquor, will be tried tomorrow afternoon in the court of Justice Joe H. Parkes. Martin was arrested several weeks since at his home on West Court street on a charge of having liquor in his possession. This is the second time he has been in court on the same charge this summer. He was fined \$100 on the former trial.

Indians Are Hunting.
The majority of Indians on the reservation are hunting now, Major E. L. Swartzlander said this morning while in Pendleton. They will probably call a temporary halt on their hunting activities by the end of this week, he says, in order to prepare themselves

for the Round-Up which they will attend at the rate of about 100 per cent.

No Rain in Sight.
There is no prospect of rain at present, says Major Lee Moorhouse, weather observer. The maximum today is 92, the minimum 59, while the barometer registers 29.80.

Teaching At Roseville.
Miss Jean Jacques Folsom, niece of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Tallman, has gone to Roseville, California, where she will be instructor in the high school in physical instruction. Miss Folsom was graduated from O. A. C. last June.

Funeral Held Sunday.
Funeral services for Paul Jones, an Indian resident of the reservation, were held Sunday at the Presbyterian church at Tutuilla. The young man died Friday, tuberculosis being the cause of his death. He was the son of Mrs. Phillip Jones and was 30 years old. He is survived by his wife and mother.

Grand Jury Continues.
The probe of the grand jury, which has been under way for three days, continues with many witnesses being examined. It was thought that it might be possible to conclude the investigation this evening, but this is now thought to be an impossibility. No bills have been returned by the inquisitorial body yet.

Faces Booze Charge.
Green Estes was arrested and placed in the city jail this morning on a charge of illegal possession of intoxicants. Chief of Police W. R. Taylor and a federal officer declare they found five cases of bonded whisky at Estes' living quarters yesterday afternoon. Estes failed to appear in the city court this morning, the officers say, so he was arrested. It is likely that the case will go to federal court at Portland, Chief Taylor stated. Estes was convicted on a similar charge two years ago.

On Overloading Charge.
A fine of \$10 and costs was levied against A. Isaacson this morning in the court of Justice Joe H. Parkes on a charge of driving a truck over the state highway with more than a legal weight load. The arrest was made by C. L. Lienallen, state traffic officer. It was claimed that Isaacson had 3,000 pounds more on his truck than the law permits. The case of the same kind against the Smythe-Lomeran company was set for tomorrow morning. It is charged that the Smythe-Lomeran company truck was overloaded by 750 pounds. A plea of not guilty to the charge was made in court at the hearing this morning.

ARGENTINE ORDERS GREAT TELESCOPE

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 13.—Constructed here by the Warner & Swasey Company for the Argentine National Observatory, one of the largest telescopes in the world will be shipped to Cordoba, Argentina, from this city. Designed to follow the motion of the stars through the southern hemisphere, it will be the largest telescope in South America. It could not be used in the northern hemisphere, because of its mounting.

At the time the order for the giant telescope was placed, five years ago, it would have been the largest in the world. Because of the war its completion was delayed and now there are two others said to be larger.

The telescope has a sixty-inch reflector. When set up it resembles a gigantic howitzer gun. The tube is six feet in diameter and twenty-four feet long. A large forked iron support rises from the concrete base and holds the tube.

One hundred and fifty million distinct astral bodies in the nebulae of the firmament can be detected through the instrument, as compared with 5000 visible to the naked eye. A camera attached to the telescope has been shown in tests to be capable of registering 25,000 separate bodies on plates from a section of the sky smaller than the moon.

The chief reflecting mirror of the instrument weighs more than a ton. It is five feet in diameter and eight and one-half inches thick at the central focus.

Delicate electrical control and star-setting apparatus complete the perfectly-balanced mechanism of the machine, which, with all parts, weighs approximately twenty-five tons. A worm gear, accurate to one-two-hundred and fifty thousandths of an inch, is operated by a delicate mechanism.

The instrument was designed by E. P. Burrell, of the Warner & Swasey company.

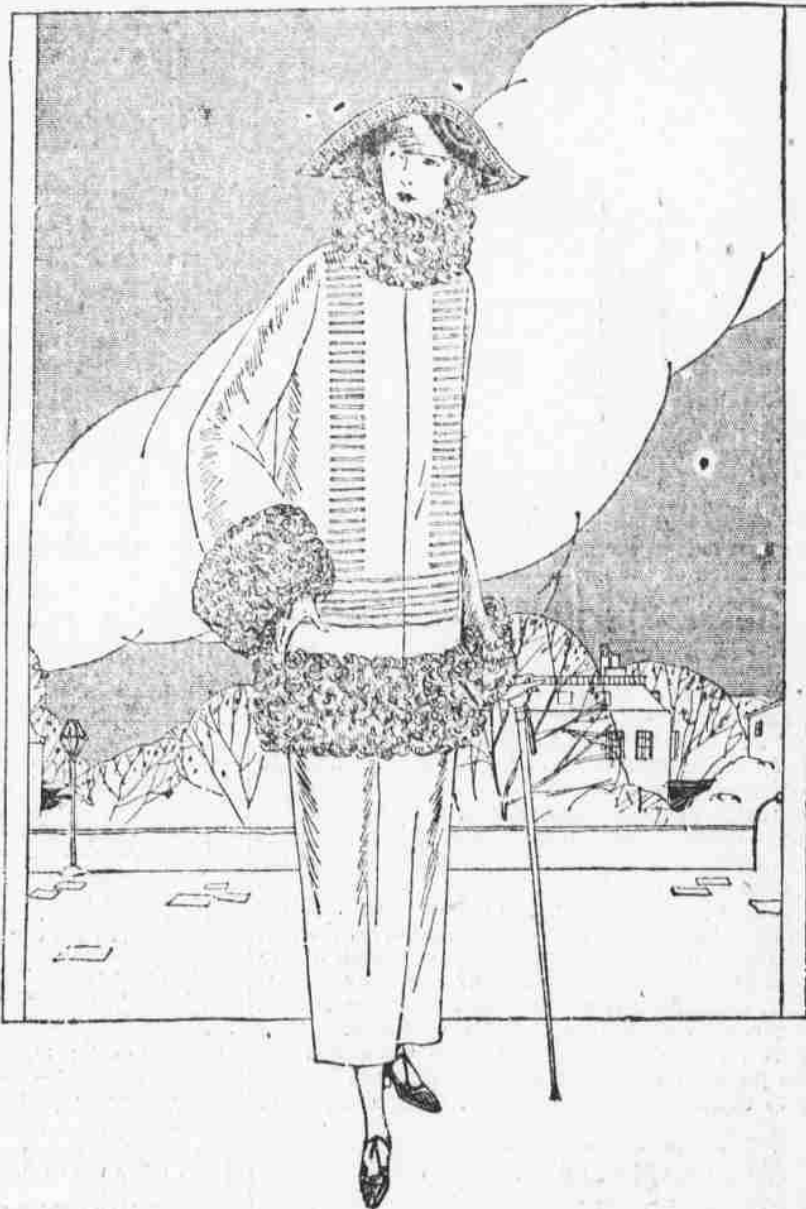

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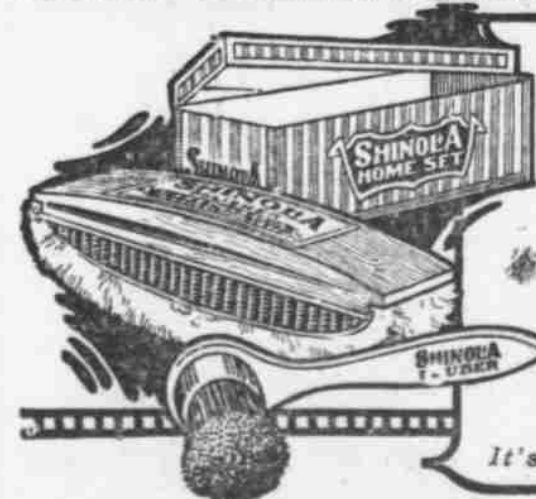
