

Philippines May Yield Gold and Platinum in Big Quantity, Belief

MANILA, Sept. 21.—Will the Philippines yield both oil and platinum as a result of explorations and mining now being carried on for the first time by ample capital? In samples from placer mining at Lagonoy, Surigao, Mindanao, the Bureau of Science found 68 per cent platinum and 6 per cent gold. But compared to the number of yards of material passed through the dredge, the platinum recovery was small. A thorough survey is to be made for the owners, Persian capitalists of Hong Kong, to ascertain whether or not the platinum is in paying quantities.

Platinum is widespread in the Philippines, and Mindanao, where this latest find is made, is only a chance's distance from Borneo, the second most important platinum field in the world. Until 1832 miners of Borneo tossed the platinum away as worthless, debased metal. Up to date it has not been found in paying quantities in the Philippines, but it would surprise no one if pay deposits were found.

As to the oil, the Standard Company keeps on with its wildcatting on Bandoe Peninsula, Southern Tayabas, and has also acquired properties in Leyte, considered now to be as much better field. The latest well at Bandoe has indicated both oil and gas, but seemingly not concentrated. Other wealthy American companies have an eye on the work of the Standard Oil Company, which operates here as the Richmond Petroleum Company, subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company of California.

HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES

- * The day's meals are more palatable if some of the day's fuel is supplied by foods rich in sugar.
- * Avoid too much highly-sweetened food, since it destroys the desire for less highly-flavored but more necessary food.
- * Foods containing sugar are: sweet fruits, vegetables, desserts, honey, molasses and sirups, sugar.
- * A part of the day's fuel is always supplied by foods rich in a substance called protein. The body needs protein because of its value as a building material.
- * The energy that it furnishes may be regarded as a by-product.
- * An adult should regulate the amount of food by the work he is doing, i. e., if he is doing corn he will be using more energy than if he is sitting quietly in an office, and therefore, will need more food to supply this energy.
- * If you weigh more than you should, it is an indication that you are taking more food than your body needs for the work you do.—V. D.
