American Queen?
PARIS, Sept. 27.—(U. P.)—Paris speculated today upon whether former Mrs. William B. Leeds, widow of the American tin plate king, now Princess Anastasia as wife of Prince Christopher of Greece might get a chance at the Greek throne. The woman refused to make a statement, but Prince Christopher pointed out that Princes George and Paul and several others stood between him and the throne. The former Mrs. Leeds, it is known, has spent millions furthering Constantinian's plans for Greek unity.

Purchases Cigar Stand.
A deal was closed today whereby ownership of the cigar stand in the lobby of the Hotel Dolon changed hands. A. B. Mays, well known Pendletonian, is the purchaser of the place, Boone Wilson having sold to him. Mr. Mays plans to increase the size of stock carried in the stand. He will handle cigars, tobaccos, candies and magazines. He is experienced in this line of business.

Social Meeting Held.
The noon luncheon of Rotarians today was given over to sociality. Several song numbers were enjoyed, "Alfalfa Hay" being sung in memory of the Round-Up which has just gone into history. The Pendleton club is running neck and neck with the Walla Walla club in an attendance contest, the winners of which will be feted at a dinner given by the losing club sometime in November. Pendleton's attendance stands at 94 1-2 per cent at present.

To Celebrate Birthday.
There are but six people who have resided in Eastern Oregon as long as has J. P. Walker, pioneer who will celebrate his sixty-eighth birthday tomorrow. Mr. Walker, who has resided in Pendleton for the past 25 years, came to Eastern Oregon from Brownsville 1 year ago. The trip from Brownsville to Dufur took six days, coming by team and by boat. Mr. Walker well recalls when there were no houses east of the Deschutes. His father served during the Indian wars under "Cap" Blakey. Mr. Walker has for 29 years been clerk of the Woodmen of the World, and is the pioneer clerk of the entire order.

Kash Kash Wins Case.
Notice from the Secretary of the Interior in the case of the estate of Thommasani reaffirming the opinion of the commissioner of Indian affairs has been received in Pendleton by Peterson, Bishop and Clark. Thommasani made a will in which she left 160 acres of valuable land on the reservation to James Kash and his wife. The will was contested by Annie Hayes. The commissioner of Indian affairs upheld the will, and Judges Lowell and Kim, representing Annie Hayes made an appeal to the Secretary of the Interior. The secretary upheld the decision of the commissioner, and the case is settled. The Kash Kashes expect a patent for the land within a short time from the government. The case was in court for two years.

Sentenced to Two Years.
M. P. Lindsey, colored, who was found guilty in circuit court by a jury of a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, was sentenced to serve two years in the state penitentiary this morning by Judge G. W. Phelps.
