UNIVERSITY PREPARED TO WELCOME STUDENTS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Sept. 29.—When new and old students arrive in Eugene for the opening of the fall term at the University of Oregon, they will find no difficulties in obtaining comfortable lodgings near the campus, according to the University officials and the leaders of the various campus organizations who are cooperating to welcome the student.

Freshmen will arrive in Eugene not later than Saturday in order to comply with admission requirements. Many of the old students will come this week, although registration days are not until next Monday and Tuesday.

A complete list of housing facilities has been prepared by the campus Y. M. C. A. This work has been in charge of Mrs. Charlotte R. Donnelly, who is also directing the men's employment bureau. Mrs. Donnelly is working in cooperation with the dean of women. Dean Fox has general supervision of housing for women.

Both the campus Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. are the official representatives of the University authorities in approving and listing student lodgings and in obtaining employment for undergraduates who are partly or wholly self-supporting. Miss Dorothy Collier, secretary of the campus Y. W. C. A., is in charge of employment for University women.

"The townspeople of Eugene are cooperating fully and generously with the University deans of women and men," said Mrs. Donnelly today. "Many of the finest homes have been opened to the students, especially for the University women."

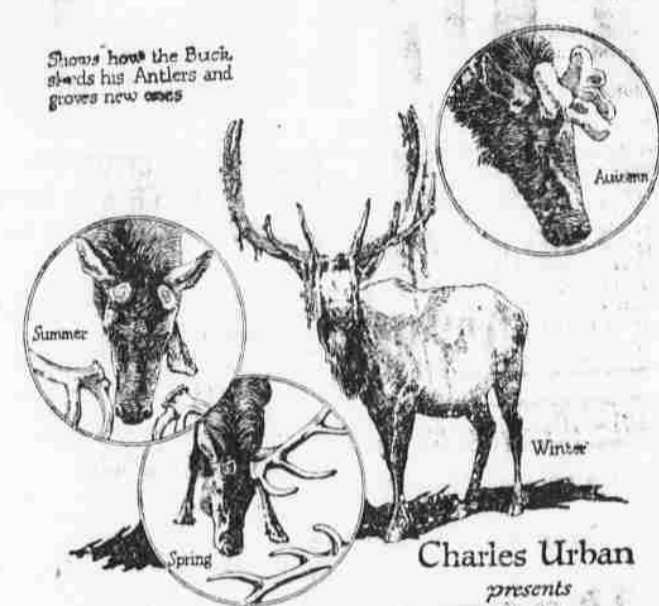

"I have been greatly pleased to find that the Eugene women who have offered themselves as hostesses to the University women through the college year have always expressed themselves as more than willing to cooperate with the dean of women in the enforcement of University regulations regarding study hours and other undergraduate requirements," Mrs. Donnelly continued.
